"The Hatchery Job."

THE latest vagary of the Summerside Journal is an attack on the salmon of Dunk River for not procuring the best part of the river to spawn in. In the opinion of our contemporary, they should go higher up. Their motto, like his own, should be *exaltatio*! Now admitting, which we readily grant, that he is an authority on the twin subjects of cold water and spawning, it must have escaped him that the salmon, like himself, try to get as high as they can, and in this hilarious endeavor are stopped by the sluices at the hatchery, past which they cannot, by any possibility, pass, excepting when the gates are purposely opened. A slight knowledge of the subject he pretends to discuss would show him that the higher up a stream a fish hatching establishment is placed the less favorable is the situation; for the reason that in spite of all precaution many of the gravid fish are overtaken by the necessity of spawning before they reach far up, and in this respect their fecundation is practically lost. In another point the Journal man shows at once his patriotism and his ignorance in deploring that salmon, as soon as the act of spawning is accomplished, go on a bee line to New Brunswick. Why New Brunswick? Last night's refrain must be ringing in his ears, "off she goes to Mirimachi, to come back (under N. P. policy) in the shape of sugar and tea." He cannot be aware that the coast fishery is of infinitely more value than the river fisheries; that rivers are, in fact, mere feeders of the coast fisheries, and that the whole south coast of the Gulf of St. Lawrence from near Quebec to east of the Bay of Chaleur bristles with salmon stations, for every one of which a license fee is charged, thus helping to make the fishery service self-supporting. The fishery of salmon has never been properly pursued as an industry along the coast of P. E. I., and partial attempts have shown a diminished product year by year for want of such a breeding source as the foresight of the Minister has now provided at Dunk River and which the editor of the Journal now maligns and misrepresents. Perhaps, also, it may set our contemporary's powerful mind somewhat at rest to be informed that the Government had the whole course of the Dunk River to choose from, and the site was the untrammelled selection of Mr. Wilmot, the greatest authority on fish-culture in this hemisphere, who waded for miles, on rather a cold day too, seeking for the many requirements that need to be combined in a fish-house. On Mr. Wilmot reporting that he had selected the spot now occupied by the Hatchery, the Minister, finding the site belonged to himself, generously donated as much land and water as the establishment can ever require, free of cost, excepting the expense of conveyance. So the jobbery charge, with other like charges made by your contemporary, falls to the ground. As to the building itself, it is there to speak for itself; and it must, in truth, be said is not only a work of which the Province may be proud, but is most creditable to the energy and forethought of the Minister and the promptitude and good workmanship of the contractors. The warden, we believe, has been instructed to show it to the public—under proper restrictions—and a very interesting locality it is. There is plenty of cold water there, and we strongly urge our journalistic friend when he next has a fit of the spleen, to pay it a visit and cool his distempered brain.

It is stated that money to build the proposed Nicaragua canal will be provided by the Rothschilds and others, provided General Grant will consent to accept the Presidency of an American Company charged with carrying on the work.

YESTERDAY morning, after the robbery of his store, Mr. Munroe traced the tea which had been stolen to a house in the vicinity of Fitzroy street. INCENDIARY FIRE!

The Torch Again Applied to Mr. Robertson's Premises.

THE vacant dwelling house of Mr. E. Robertson, situated on Grafton Street, has been again visited by an incendiary. The torch was unhesitatingly applied; but the building was saved through timely interference with the flames. The second fire was lit at six o'clock yesterday evening in a porch attached to the rear of the building. It was burning brightly when it attracted the attention of a gentleman and a number of small boys who were passing Grafton street. They immediately applied water from buckets, and extinguished the flames. The City Marshal, on visiting the premises, discovered foot prints in the snow, which he believed were those of the incendiary. They led to and from the spot where the fire was lit, and were traced through a broken corner of a fence—at the north west corner of the yard—into the yard of a house which fronts on Kent Street. They became obliterated there by marks of other foot-prints. No one has yet been arrested. An investigation was talked of but nothing has been done in the matter.

Large Meeting of Merchants.

A PROTEST AGAINST UNDER CUSTOMS' RESTRICTIONS.
A large meeting of the merchants of this city was held at the Mayor's office this forenoon. The principal speakers were W. E. Dawson, Geo. Peake, Lemuel Beer, F. T. Newbery, William Brown, Fred'k Perkins and R. Young. Free expression was given to the feelings of the business community respecting the order that all goods entered at this port be examined by appraisers, as well as respecting many instances of undue and unnecessary strictness with importers whose integrity is above suspicion. After discussion a committee consisting of F. T. Newbery, Benj. Rogers and William Brown, was appointed to draw up a memorial to the Minister of Customs and report at a future meeting.

Diphtheria in the City Schools.

We are requested to state that we were misinformed respecting the prevalence of diphtheria among the children attending the new West Kent Street School. Out of the 523 pupils, whose names are on the roll of that school, only four have died of that disease. It is true that the attendance during the past few weeks has not been as good as it should have been; but this was altogether owing to the false rumors respecting the prevalence of diphtheria in the school. We are happy to state, on the best authority, that there is not at present a single case of diphtheria in any family whose children attend that Institution.
