HALIFAX, April 7—(CP)—Official inland forecasts issued here tonight by the Dominion Public Weather Office.

There is snow throughout Nova Scotia this evening due to a storm centred some 400 miles south of Yarmouth. The storm is moving very slowly northward and the snow is expected to continue in Nova Scotia on Saturday and spread slowly northward into Prince Edward Island and Southern New Brunswick.

Over Quebec and Northern New Brunswick the weather is generally fine, because of the high pressure area extending from Labrador to Lake Ontario.

Present indications are that Easter Sunday will be sunny in most regions with temperatures a little higher than they were today.
