



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

We were delighted to have a telephone call from Cyril Rice of Andale, N.S. He is a son of Willis Rice of Middleton, who was very prominent for years in harness racing and who is still enjoying excellent health. Older horsemen will remember Mr. Willis Rice and the good horses he raced among them being Pax Volo 2.07, that had a terrific fight of speed and also had the honor of administering a defeat to the then-thought-to-be unbeatable Marjorie M. Marjorie was one of the pacers that held the Charlottetown Track record of 2:07 3/4 in the late 1930's.

Another horse Mr. Rice liked was Signal Senator 2:08 3/4, that was a winner over many Maritime tracks, also Traffic Graitan that raced well for him. Cyril inherited his father's love of horses and was quite active around the stable for several years and was with Joe O'Brien for a year, then trained and raced a stable of his own account and gave Dama Dee a mark of 2:03 and Dannie Boy Dal-Yum a record of 2:06 3/5, and also made good with several other horses. Now training and racing horses is just a pleasant recollection with Cyril and his interest are in representing a Montreal firm.

The writer of these notes attended a meeting of the directors of The United States Trotting Association held at Orlando, Florida, March 2-3-4 and received a warm welcome from other directors. While there he visited the Ben White raceway which was constructed at the suggestion of Ben F. White, noted driver of the long ago, who was honored by the citizens of Orlando on February 5th on the occasion of his 84th birthday.

Ben White was born in Canada and achieved the greatest honors in harness racing, setting up world records and also having the reputation of being one of the most gentlemanly drivers who ever sat in a sulky. In 1947 the track at Orlando was constructed and dedicated and named for Mr. White, in picturesque ceremonies. He was the first trainer to use Orlando's superb winter climate for winter training. He came there 37 years ago and the trail he blazed has brought Ben White Raceway a capacity colony of over 500 horses each year. Mr. White won practically every important harness race and is the only man to have won four Hambletonian Stakes.

The first matinee races of the season were held on Saturday afternoon, March 2, and we were all invited to be present. The Good Fellows, Inc. made up the program and gave trophies for each event. Over 2,200 people paid one dollar admission and the receipts were given over to a charity group that feeds needy families on Christmas Day and plays Santa Claus to the children.

The afternoon was perfect, the temperature being the seventies, and the races were conducted by experienced personnel. The first race, a 2-year-old pace, was won by King Christian by King's Counsel, with Poplar Kenny by Tar Heel, second. Time, 2:24 1/5. The second race, a 2-year-old trot, was won by Great Lullwater with Anna Dares 2, time, 2:23. The third race, a classified pace was won by the 5-year-old Frisco Flyer in 2:12 2/5 with the last quarter in 30 seconds. Jig Time, a 3-year-old by Good Time, driven by Walter Gibbons, manager of the Bay State Raceway, was second, the 4-year-old Thunder Hanover with Marmon Hanover, 3, second. Time, 2:12 4/5. Both of these are from the Billy Haughton stable.

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
