**Canada May** full cut-off of immigration, though he said it is recognized the intake cannot be chopped off immediately.

Immigration Minister Harris said in an interview the government does not intend to make a complete cut-off. "But," he added, "having in mind that there are representations concerning unemployment, the government this month will be considering the situation, as it does every six months." Last year, Canada brought in 168,000 immigrants. Early this year, Mr. Harris predicted the number of 1954 arrivals would be about the same. Up to now, the newcomers have been in larger numbers than for the same time last year, though officials say this has no significance. The monthly figures fluctuate from year to year.

## So. Kings Potato Growers Discuss Plebiscite Question At Montague

"A large number of potato growers assembled at Yeo's Theatre at Montague last evening for the third in a series of meetings of the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture to discuss the problems of the industry and the forthcoming plebiscite. The meeting was presided over by the president, Mr. Ronald MacDonald.

Mr. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the Provincial Marketing Board, spoke on membership and an accident insurance policy for farmers sponsored by the Federation. Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman of the potato marketing board, gave a comprehensive account of the establishing and work of the Board since 1950. He also stressed the problems facing the board during the past season. He spoke also on the forthcoming plebiscite, urging the farmers to vote so that the greatest number of returns might be had. Mr. MacDonald said that there was only one question in the ballot "are you in favor of the continued operation of the Potato Marketing Board?"

During the question period Mr. Horace Willis asked that if the plebiscite were favorable, what had the board to offer in the future. Mr. MacDonald replied that he could answer the question only in a general way for policies would have to be determined in the light of the economic and marketing situation at the time. He said he knew what the board had done in the past, but only a study of the situation of the field at the time could determine future policies. Mr. Willis then asked if the producers could have any assurances that they could sell what they produced.

Mr. MacDonald stated that the board would on an optional basis, and he could not forecast what the board would do since he was only to, first provincial grand mistress R. N. Large, E. M. Lewis, W. C. ## Maritimes Bakers Annual Meeting

AMHERST, N. S. (CP)—Arthur Edgewood of St. John's, Nfld., Wednesday was elected president of the Maritime Bakers Association at the concluding session of the 11th annual conference. Provincial vice-presidents elected were: Fred Surbeck, Bridgewater, N. S.; E. Levesque, Grand Falls, N. B.; Wilfred Kelly, Summerside, P. E. I.; Wesley Stewart, Sydney Mines, Cape Breton; and Paul Walsh, St. John's, Nfld. Fred Myles of Saint John, N. S., and Ben Moir of Halifax were named representatives to the national council. Maynard Larkin of St. Stephen, N. B., was named secretary-treasurer.

2. Canada should seek ways of participating in the European payments union set up to help the flow of goods and money among European countries. 3. Sales of goods to tourists should be tax free. 4. Taxes on profits from Canadian exports and investments abroad should be reduced. 5. Labor unions and their leaders should be informed of the impact of wage demands on production costs. Meeting wages were added to prices, reducing exporters' chances of competing against foreign production in foreign markets. 6. Efforts should be made to redirect some of Canada's purchases, say of citrus fruits, from the United States to Middle East and other soft currency areas to provide with more dollars to finance purchases from Canada. 7. Freight charges on shipments to Canadian seaports should be reduced and steps taken to educate Canadians on foreign trade problems in high schools and universities.

**URGENT MOVE ON SEAPORTS** Senator Gordon Innes (L—Nova Scotia) urged that steps be taken to promote greater use of Maritime seaports. Senator G. P. Campbell (L—Ontario) said the deep sea fleet was being decimated by high costs and by the lack of a clear-cut government policy. Senator F. W. Pirie (L—New Brunswick), an industrialist, said business men must do their own "missionary" work in order to promote exports. They had to make visits to importing countries and gain the confidence of the local buyers.
