

Mr. Parnell has written a letter, in which he says: "The statements of Lord Hartington that the Irish party and National League are in union with American Fenians are untrue. I know nothing whatever of any Fenian organization in Ireland or America, beyond what I have learned from the newspapers. I have never had any communication with the leaders of such organizations, or accepted any alliance with them. I do not even know who the leaders are. No union of the National League and Fenians has ever been proposed. If such a proposal had ever been made, I should never have consented. I have always successfully endeavored to keep the National League within the strict bounds of legality. In spite of the unblinking falsehoods which have partially and temporarily frustrated the moderate aspirations of Ireland, the Irish people will continue to maintain a peaceable and legal aspect, declining to afford any pretext to Lord Hartington or his allies to resort to the brutalities of coercion."

In 1880, after he had made the Canadian Pacific Railway contract, Sir John Macdonald told the Cartier Club at Montreal that if he did not live to see the road completed he would at least have the satisfaction of looking down upon a transcontinental line on Canadian territory. The Premier is now making a trip over the finished line, and the dream of his life is realized. The worry, anxiety and obstruction Sir John has met in pushing this great work to a successful issue would have broken down a man of less determination. The St. James' Gazette, speaking of the undertaking, says: "Sir John Macdonald is the best known and most distinguished of British Colonial statesmen, and it is not too much to say that but for his persistent and consistent policy in the matter the Canadian Pacific Railway would have remained a project for another quarter of a century." Every true Canadian will wish the most distinguished of British Colonial statesmen a safe and pleasant trip.

If the prodigious growth of the French-Canadian population has excited the surprise of economists, not less than remarkable, says Paris-Canada, is the longevity of that nationality. Among the veterans of the war of 1812 and 1813, waged so gloriously by the Canadian people against the United States, there are still surviving 62 of the age of 90, 31 aged 91, 30 aged 92, 17 aged 93, 5 aged 94, 15 aged 95, 5 aged 96, 6 aged 97, 8 aged 98, 4 aged 99, 2 aged 100, 1 aged 101. Since 1881 the number of those veterans has been reduced from 1,259 to 328. These figures, taken from the official report of Sir A. P. Caron, minister of militia, as well as an examination of the parochial registers, prove that if it is easy to be born on the banks of the St. Lawrence, it takes a long time to die there—thanks to unintermitted peace, a happy life and healthy climate.

We do not hear very much in these days of mummy wheat and barley, but many people firmly believe that the seeds of both plants found with Egyptian mummies, and supposed to be 3,000 or 4,000 years old, will sprout if put in the ground. A few years ago such wheat was commonly sold as a curiosity, and it was alleged that many purchasers succeeded in raising a small crop from it. Prof. Bentley, who has recently commenced a series of lectures on the physiology of plants, asserts most emphatically that no grains which with certainty have been identified as contemporaneous with the deposit of the mummified corpse have ever come to life. In cases where the so-called mummy wheat has germinated it has been introduced into the coffin shortly before or at the time of discovery of the body.

A few years ago, when a Scottish parliamentary candidate was canvassing his constituency, he called at the house of an aged couple. Finding the woman alone, he entered into conversation with her and asked her to use her influence in getting her husband to vote for him. While they were conversing the would-be M. P. noticed a kitten amusing itself on the floor, and, taking it up, praised its beauty and offered her £5 for it. The bargain was struck, and, on leaving, he again expressed the hope that she would secure her husband's vote for him.
