

Boston Downs Habs 3-1; Toronto Blanks Hawks 1-0

BOSTON (CP)—Boston Bruins scored twice in the first period, then hung on until Don McKenney slammed a 50-foot shot into an empty net with 22 seconds left, to defeat Montreal Canadiens 3-1 Sunday night in a National Hockey League game before 10,496.

Bruins goalie Terry Sawchuk was the brilliant in the third period as the Canadiens swarmed the Boston cage. Terry had 33 saves to Jacques Plante's 34.

Montreal pinned Plante with about 50 seconds remaining in a last effort to break through the Bruins' defence but McKenney intercepted the puck at centre ice and blasted it home.

At 9:30 of the final, Sawchuk saved the day when he stretched himself full length to spear a shot from Dickie Moore bearing down on him unopposed. Moore knocked the puck out of the glove into the net but referee Udvari ruled the whistle had blown.

LONG SHOT
Bob Armstrong got his first goal in 74 games with a 50-footer at 2:15 of the first period and Jerry Toppazzini faked out defenceman Tom Johnson perfectly to beat Plante at 11:16.

Moore poked the puck into the right corner of the cage from a scramble 30 seconds later and that was the scoring until McKenney's finishing touch.

The Boston triumph was freshman Johnny Peirson left in the first period with a thigh injury when tripped by Doug Harvey.

In Hamilton, the Tiger-Cats, with quarter Tony Curcillo sparking an inspired passing and running attack, scored three touchdowns in the final quarter to whip Ottawa Rough Riders 40-24.

The Al's hold down first place in Big Four standings. Tiger-Cats trail by six points and are assured a tie for the third and last playoff spot. The Rough Riders are third and Argos hold down the cellar position.

Out West, Edmonton Eskimos regained their lead in the WFLU playoff race with a 37-17 win over Saskatchewan Roughriders. The loss dropped the Roughriders into a second-place tie with Winnipeg Blue Bombers.


