

Saints Play For N.B.-P.E.I. BB Title Today

The Varsity basketball squad takes to the hardwood this afternoon to meet the Mount Allison Mounties in the deciding game for the N.B.-P.E.I. basketball title. The winner will advance against the Nova Scotia win for the Maritime crown.

Saints must come through with a win by a margin of 17 points in order to gain the playoff spot. The league standings are very close, and the only chance the Saints have is to win the contest this afternoon. If the required 17 points, if the game is tied at the end of regulation time, an over time period will be played, as it is imperative that a winner be determined immediately.

This is the closest the Saints have come to the title in many years, and we suggest that you come and support them in their attempt.

DROP U.N.B. 6-5

The Varsity hockey team edged the University of New Brunswick squad by one goal at the University arena last Saturday evening in what turned out to be one of the best exhibitions of hockey we have seen here this season. This was the last inter-collegiate contest of the year for the Saints, and they were out to prove that they belong in the league, despite the fact they are not always at full strength and that they are the victims of circumstances in many cases.

Taking an early lead in the first and second periods, which were wide open hockey, the Saints seemed to concentrate too much on control hockey in the final, and the fans saw U.N.B. nearly tie the score in the third. The fifth U.N.B. tally came just as the horn went to end the game, a tremendously fast slap shot from the blue line which Shepherd never saw. However, the Red and Whittiers had too great a lead for the New Brunswickers to overcome, and the locals went on to win.

Tony Manning fired two for the Saints, as did Gus Harris. The latter, scored a beautiful goal on a slap shot from the blueline, which caught the open corner of the net and which hardly left the ice. Whalen and Noonan collected the other two to round out the scoring for the night on the part of the Saints. Several of the Saints played outstanding hockey, and deserve a great deal of credit for the victory. Among them were: Manning, Rivard, Shepherd, Whalen, and Harris.

SECOND SAINTS

Bob Linegar's boys defeated the Y.M.C.A. on Saturday afternoon in the University gym by a score of 45-28. This was the second straight win for the lads in

their fight for the all important playoff spot. The first came on Wednesday evening when the Saints dropped the visiting R.C.A.F. Sultans by only five points.

However, the winning streak did not last too long. On Sunday afternoon, the league leading Trotters invaded the University gym to play a regular league game and emerged the winners by a score of 54-31. The game was one of the best, this year with the score tied at the final whistle and an extra period was deemed necessary. Four quick, unanswered baskets caused the Saints to lose the encounter on this occasion, although they did rally in the dying minutes of the contest which would change the score in their favor.

JUVENILES DROP

The Junior Varsity were scheduled to play a game over the weekend, but, due to unknown circumstances, the opposition failed to make an appearance and the Juveniles were pressed into service. Having practiced for nearly an hour and a half before they were informed that they were to play the Juniors, no one conceded them much chance of winning the encounter.

The Juveniles waltzed to a 9-4 victory with only a token of resistance. The Juniors were unable to hit stride until late in the third period and, then it was too late to do anything. Fr. Ledwell's lads are on the ice all the time practicing for the league title which they hope to capture this year. So far they have lost only one league game, that to P. W. C. by one goal.

DROP P.W.C. 6-1

The Juveniles visited the P. W. C. squad at the Sports Arena on Tuesday evening and, after seeing the Charlottetown lads fire one goal in the starting minutes of play, turned on the steam and eased to a 6-1 victory. MacDonald rifled two and singles went to Noonan, O'Brian, Sherry, and Tingley. This seems to indicate that the Saints are the favourites to win the league title and to advance against the New Brunswick representatives. The playoffs must be completed before the fourteenth of the month and the remaining games will be played in rapid succession to finish the schedule.

The squad is to play another game this week and this will be played at the University rink on Thursday afternoon and we will report on that next week.

While on the subject of hockey, we might mention the fact that the Varsity also played a game this week and that was played on Thursday evening at the University. The visitors were the

Garrison Juniors and, seeing as the contest has not been played as yet, we will give the results in the next edition of the WEEK.

next week and we urge all the students to support them in every way.

Three Killed, Six Injured In Collision

MARMORA, Ont. (CP)—Three persons were killed and six were injured, one critically, in a two-car collision two miles west of here Saturday night. Fred George Collings, 48, of Toronto, Mrs. Jean Anderson, 49, and her son, Peter, 27, also of Toronto, were killed. They had moved to Toronto from Dartmouth, N.S., last August. Critically injured was Don Anderson, 13.

Injured in the other car were Edward Hyde, 24, his wife, Marie, 22, Mrs. Angus Galloway, 35, and Ernest Dunley, 33, all from Madoc, 12 miles east of here. Police said the Collings car apparently went out of control on a straight stretch of highway, went into a skid and smashed

broadside into the other car. It is "highly likely" the Liberal Marmoras is 35 miles east of Peterborough.

Arrow Debate Will Be Tried In The Commons

OTTAWA (CP)—An attempt is expected to be made in the Commons today to launch a special debate on the government's decision to scrap the Arrow jet interceptor.

It would be made in a motion from the opposition to suspend the normal business of the House in favor of a "matter of urgent public importance." Normal business for today is proposed legislation by private members. Opposition Leader Pearson said he will discuss the matter with his colleagues in the morning and

CCF WOULD ACT CCF House leader Hazen Argue said that if the Liberals do not raise the matter, he will. The "matter of urgent public importance will be the unemployment caused by the government's decision," he said.

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
