Tonight is the Night

Undoubtedly the most important event of the theatre of the present season will be the presentation of "Seven Days' Leave" at the Prince Edward tonight.

The big London and New York success, which enjoyed a run of six months at the Park Theatre, New York and played 2 years at the Lyceum Theatre, London, and with a record of box office receipts, transcending all records in the history of the modern play houses, has for its author Walter Howard, a successful maker of plays.

"Seven Days' Leave" is a war comedy, yet attacks the great world drama from what might be termed the inside. Its scenes lie about London. His fiancée observes as much and the emotions of all concerned are tense when it is suddenly revealed that the coquette, the second woman who would be wooed, while professing to be a Belgian refugee, is actually one of the type often shot as something else. And with this revelation the play is under way with excitement and thrills succeeding each other until a spectacular denouement occurs in the blowing up of a submarine in view of the audience. 503.
