LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Kernaghan—A Reminiscence.

Sir,—It must be thirty years since one winter day, at dinner, a telegram was handed my father, addressed to the Rev. Theophilus DeBrisay. As the only surviving son of "the old parson," who died 14th March, 1823 (some 40 years before), my father opened it. It was from Mr. Kernaghan, an Irish solicitor, who was at Cape Tormentine waiting to cross to the Island, and it intimated that my grandfather's presence was urgently required in his native land, to prove the marriage of the late Cesar Colclough (pronounced Colkely), Chief Justice of P. E. Island.

After a day or two Mr. Kernaghan arrived. His business was important; the succession of a branch of the Colclough family to the estate of Tintern Abbey depended upon proof of the marriage of our Chief Justice of that name, and it was supposed that my grandfather, as Rector of St. Paul's, had performed the marriage ceremony. But no record of such marriage was to be found in the books, and the memory of the oldest inhabitant could not recall such an event having taken place in Charlottetown. Eventually the late Mr. Theophilus Stewart accompanied Mr. Kernaghan to Ireland, and his evidence established the case for that gentleman's clients. Mr. Stewart's testimony was based upon his acquaintance with Cesar Colclough and his family in Newfoundland, where he held office after leaving P. E. Island.

I remember distinctly that Mr. Kernaghan was anxious to entertain the principal Charlottetonians, and wished to have "the parson at the head of the table and the priest at the foot"—so he expressed it. Religious strife was running very high at the time, and it was explained to Mr. K. that such an arrangement of the table would be impossible. I cannot recollect whether the dinner took place, but I do remember that Mr. Kernaghan was very much shocked at such an alarming state of society.

It was evidently a condition of affairs to which the Colclough family have always been strangers, if we are to judge from the following newspaper clipping, which I ask you to be kind enough to publish, and which, I think, will prove interesting to some of your readers.

A WEXFORD LANDLORD HONORED BY DECEASED.—A novel incident occurred in Tintern Abbey, Wexford, recently, when a presentment was made against a tenant and a purse of sovereigns to Captain P. D. B. Colclough, J. P., who with his family are threatened with eviction from the abbey. At the beginning of the land agitation Captain Colclough gave his tenants a reduction in rent of 25 per cent, by which means he had deprived himself of any benefit from the estate. The remainder of the rents went entirely to the mortgagees, chargeants and creditors, so that the generous-hearted Captain's sacrifice for the tenants meant the handing over to them of all that otherwise he would receive for his own support. Captain Colclough said, in response to the presentment: "My heart is too full of gratitude to the Catholic priests and people of Wexford for the efforts they have made on behalf of my family and myself, to allow me to speak as I ought in thanking you and them for the kind act. And why should it not be so? Looking beyond and above the monetary value of the present which you have just handed me, I would not reason to be proud to-night! Was there ever a man in the history of this country such an example of the noble and high-spirited character of the people of Ireland, and of the people of Wexford in particular? Here am I suffering in religion from you and your leaders, coming as I do from amongst a class which has always been regarded as the bane and the curse of the people of Ireland—here am I when in trouble, supported through thick and thin by the very people who in the natural course of events would wish me and my family to be driven out of the country." A dinner was then served in Tintern Abbey, during which Capt. Colclough proposed the health of "the priesthood of Ireland." He said that as far back as '98 his great-grandfather had saved the lives of two Catholic priests, and had sheltered them in the Castle of Rathrobin, where they lived. He was in charge of the peace of the district, and as supposed to be on the hunt for the friars when he was sheltering them. They remained there until the disturbance was over, and a small farm of fourteen acres was set apart for their benefit by the family. They remained there for many years until the time came when the laws against Catholics were repealed, and ever since the farm was locally known as the "Priest's Meadow." As an Irish Protestant his proudest boast on behalf of himself and family, both on the side of the Biddulphs and the Colcloughs, was that when in Ireland a price was set on the head of a Catholic priest just with the same formality as on the head of a wolf or other vermin, there was not a member of them ever took part, direct or indirect, in the disgraceful hunt. No, he had always esteemed it an honor, which he prized dearly, to have the friendship of the Catholic priest, and he hoped the bond which now existed between the Colcloughs and the clergy of Tintern, Ramoynge, The Hook, Sturton's Parish and all round the country would never break, but would strengthen and cement them more closely as years went by.

A Hard Profession.
