

Plane Wrecks Are Found In Zuider Zee

OTTAWA (CP)—As the indefatigable Dutch roll back the Zuider Zee to create new farmland they are finding remains of planes which crashed during the Second World War in that salty arm of the North Sea.

Gerrie Zwaneburg, 37, of Baarn, The Netherlands, has made a hobby of tracing these lost aircraft and reports on his findings in the current issue of the *Rondeel*, the RCAF magazine.

He says the Royal Air Force, RCAF and other Dominion air forces alone lost some 236 planes over Holland during the war and that at least 130 came down in the Zuider Zee.

In 1960, a special team from the Royal Netherlands Air Force began to gather up wreckage found in East Flevoland, reclaimed from the Zuider Zee since the Second World War.

SKELETONS FOUND
The skeletons of fliers have been found in some wrecks, identified and buried in nearby village graveyards.

Mr. Zwaneburg, who used to watch fleets of bombers shuttle over the Netherlands, Britain and Germany, says 13 intact aircraft have been found so far. One was a First World War German Gotha bomber and another a post-war Dutch fighter.

The 11 Second World War planes found were: Two Lancasters, a Wellington bomber, one Spitfire, one Mosquito, two American Flying Fortresses and four German fighters.

The Mosquito was something of a mystery because its wreckage contained German ammunition. Was it a captured British plane flown by a German crew? Though identification of many planes and parts is impossible because factory numbers have been eroded, Mr. Zwaneburg says he has been able to show, for example, that salvaged parts of a Wellington bomber came from a plane flown by No. 429 RCAF squadron and shot down Jan. 21, 1947.

Job Report Is Issued By Bureau

OTTAWA (CP)—A teen-ager runs the greatest risk of being unemployed when he enters the current labor market.

A detailed report on employment in 1964, issued by the bureau of statistics Wednesday, showed that the unemployment rate among workers 14-19 years of age averaged 10.3 per cent. The national average for all groups was 4.7 per cent.

Married women in the labor force ran the least risk of joining the jobless ranks. Their unemployment rate over the year worked out to 1.8 per cent.

The report also showed that about 30 per cent of the country's teen-agers are in the permanent labor force—at work or looking for jobs. In midsummer this jumps to about 48 per cent with students on temporary jobs.

72,000 HUNT FOR WORK
On the 12-month average there were 700,000 teen-agers in the labor force with 72,000 hunting for work.

Of the married women in the country, 977,000 or 25.7 per cent were members of the labor force. Average unemployment among them was 18,000.

The average rate of unemployment among married men 20 or over was 3.7 per cent. The rate for single men 20 and over was 8.9 per cent and for single women 29 per cent.

Continuing the trend that began a decade ago, married women formed a major part of the 1964 labor force. That group outnumbered the single women (647,000), single men (850,000) and teen-agers.

Among those 65 and over, in 1964 there were 15.1 per cent or 224,000 still active in the labor market. An estimated 8,000 of them were job-hunting in the average month.

George Hees Expected To Seek Leadership

TORONTO (CP)—The Telegram says George Hees, former trade and commerce minister, will seek the national leadership of the Progressive Conservative party whenever John Diefenbaker steps down.

Mr. Hees has made his intention known to friends in Ottawa, Toronto, Montreal and western Ontario, the newspaper says in a copyright report from Ottawa.

Former transport and trade and commerce minister in the Diefenbaker government, Mr. Hees resigned during the cabinet crisis of 1963 which brought down the government and ended six years of Conservative party rule.

He retired from active politics and did not try for re-election in Toronto-Broadview, the constituency he had represented since 1950. Last April he became president of the Montreal and Canadian Stock Exchanges in Montreal.

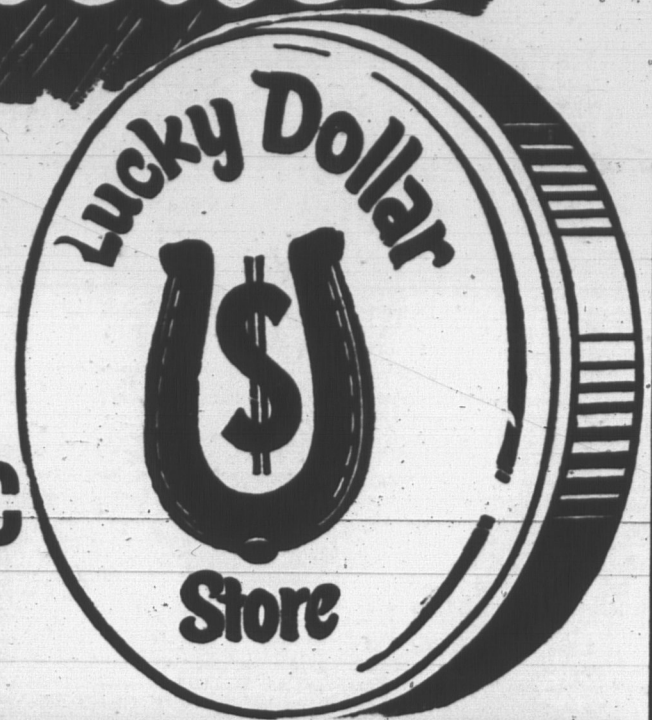
