Saints Play First Home Game of Season Today

This is football day at St. Dunstan's as Ed Hilton's Varsity Saints open their home schedule against the UNB Redmen. The Saints lost their first game 12-1 against Shearwater Flyers and their second a 6-0 trouncing at the hands of St. Mary's Huskies. Coach Hilton has sent his charges through seven rough scrimmages this week hoping that he can get more mileage out of his players. Without undue optimism Hilton said about the teams clash: "This year's club is better balanced than last year's and we have more depth and experience. It's about time we started to win."

Actually, this game is a must win for St. Dunstan's if they are going to make any headway this year. Coach Hilton has planned no major shakeup in personnel, but trainer Gerry Henry reports that a number of players have minor injuries. Quarterback John Driscoll is still having a trouble with a leg injury received last week; Jim Davis' hand hasn't healed properly; and Dave Morton is bothered with sore ankles.

One department which the Saints will have to improve in is their aerial attack. The duo of Ripley and Driscoll threw twenty passes against St. Mary's and completed only five. That gave them 81 yards, adding to their rushing total of 57 to make 148 on the game. The big point, however, was the five interceptions made by the Huskies. One of them went directly for a major, and two others set up touchdowns. Of the 57 yards made in rushing Leslie Ellis made 35, including three; fullback Mike McPhie managed 16 yards in seven attempts.

A bumper crowd is expected for this afternoon's game so suggest you come early. Game time is 1:30 p.m.

DEBATING LEAGUE

The Maritime Intercollegiate Debating League comprises teams from all the universities in the Atlantic Provinces. Each year one university must supply

an executive and act as host to the other university. This year Memorial University, St. John's, Newfoundland, has been chosen as the league centre, and is holding the first congress of the new executive. St. Dunstan's debating president, Grover Chaitson, is going to attend the congress. A set of round-robin debates will be scheduled to decide Maritime finalists and suggestions of topics for the National Conference (which is actually the debate for the Canadian championship) are also to be aired at the meeting.

John Flannigan and Mary Donovan, SDU representatives at the national meeting of N.P.C.U.S. returned from Edmonton this week and announced the change in name of the organization to C.U.S., Canadian Union of Students. This change in name is partly the result of the friction between French and English students at some Quebec Universities. One announcement that will be welcomed in the intercollegiate circles is that the congress agreed in principle to have the National Debating Championship held in this city. This is the result of an anxiety expressed by local debating moderator, Rev. Francis Bulger. It was desired to have the championship held here in conjunction with other activities to be staged here in 1964. Incidentally, if the finals are held here, it will be the first time it was held in a Maritime Centre.

Undoubtedly all students at St. Dunstan's will welcome this weekend as a chance to be away from classes for a few days. Because of the Thanksgiving holiday, everyone is off from Friday at 4 until classes resume on Tuesday at 8:40. Most of the Island students will go home after the football game this afternoon, although some make trips to other Maritime centres in roommates or friends. A number of students are talking of making the trip to Halifax to cheer the local Juniores to victory Sunday afternoon.

HOCKEY STRAITS
Now that hockey has started,

at least at the major league level, it is interesting to note that the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey Conference has issued its schedule for 1963-1964. The M.I.H.C. is a nine team loop of all the universities in the Maritimes. St. Dunstan plays eleven games this year; five of them are at home. The Saints open the season with a road trip to UNB on November 30, but don't play their first home game until January 24 against Mount Allison.

Rev. Andrei Urosov, S.J. Ph.D., the only Jesuit priest in the Western World delivered a very interesting and informative talk on "Russia, past and present" and "Communism, its present and future effects on the world," in the gymnasium last Sunday. Father Urosov spoke to a capacity crowd of 700 students and townspeople as well as answering a number of probing five questions put to him by people in the audience.

The next day he celebrated a Holy Mass—not in the Latin rite but in his own Byzantine. For most of the students it was the first opportunity of attending mass in another rite of the church. Before the Mass he explained the differences in procedure and why they were followed. Father Urosov has given over 2,000 such talks in different parts of Canada and the United States. He was instrumental in establishing an Institute for Russian studies at Fordham University and a Catholic Russian centre in San Francisco.

The local CPUCS executive and president Noreen Cameron, in conjunction with national president, Douglas E. MacLeod, are catering to the National Congress to be held at SDU this weekend. The executive is expecting upwards of 50 delegates from other Catholic Colleges in Canada.

Jayvee manager R. A. O'Connell reports that the dates have been set for the SDU, Mt. Allison Jayvee series. The first game is at Mount A next Friday afternoon, and the second is here November 9. There will also be a series with Prince of Wales, but the dates have not been finalized. The team had a scrimmage with the High School team on Monday and has been practicing every day now for the past two weeks.

Lobsterman Draws Fine

SUMMERSIDE — Charged with using a boat to fish lobsters which had been used to fish lobsters in another area during the spring season, Ernest Birch Ramsay, Conway, was fined \$25 and costs by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, in Prince County magistrate's court Thursday.

In addition the magistrate ordered that the lobsters which were in the boat at the time of the offence be confiscated. A freestow train was fined \$25 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a charge of causing damage to a CNR passenger train. The damage was caused when the accused threw a potato at the passing train and broke a window.

An Alberton resident pleaded not guilty to a charge of assaulting his wife by striking her on the face and was remanded in custody to Oct. 15.

POLIO CASES

OTTAWA (CP)—There were four cases of paralytic polio reported in Canada during the week ended Oct. 5, the health department said Friday. All four cases were in Quebec, bringing that province's total for the year to 78. Only six other cases have been reported in Canada so far this year. At the same time last year there had been 85 cases reported, 89 of them in Quebec. There have been 10 deaths from the disease this year compared with two in 1962.

Children Move To Curling Rink
ALBERTON — At the October meeting of Alberton branch of the Retarded Children's Association it was announced that the children have moved to

their new classroom in the curling club and that the legion has kindly agreed to pay the rent.
