OTTAWA (CP) — Opposition Leader Pearson's foray into New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island last week gave him new confidence in Liberal chances there in the general election expected this year.

He couldn't help but be encouraged when fiery Premier Robboud of New Brunswick, occupying the same platform with him in Fredericton, predicted Liberals will win seven of New Brunswick's 10 seats, a gain of four.

And in Prince Edward Island, where Liberals didn't elect a member in 1958, he drew comment from a mid-day meeting attended by more than 100 persons in Summerside and a packed hall of more than 800 supporters in Charlottetown.

But if the two-province swing strengthened Mr. Pearson's already-evident confidence it also shows his supporters that the Liberal leader is a far different campaigner from the Pearson who fought the 1958 election and in the Conservative landslide.
