THE KINGFISHER.

The great value of the Canadian fisheries imposes upon the Government the duty of guarding them from two dangers—poaching by Americans and illegal fishing by our own people. For experience has shown that if a season is not fixed during which no fishing is permitted, it is only a question of time within which the fisheries will be destroyed. In this double duty ships have been placed in commission, commanded by competent officers. On board these vessels there is all the discipline of an English man of war, and were it not for the absence of heavy guns it would require an expert to tell the difference between them.

We lately paid a visit to one of these vessels, the Kingfisher, commanded by Capt. Kent, and she is well worth a visit. The order and neatness and discipline which one sees impresses one greatly.

The Kingfisher is a schooner of about 100 tons, and experts say that her model is almost perfect. Those of us who, being merely landmen, are unable to appreciate the lines of a vessel, are attracted by her long low hull, her sharp bow and her raking masts, quite unlike anything we see in the vessels engaged in commerce.

Exclusive of the captain there are 22 men on board. She is armed with a nine pounder, besides having a supply of rifles and revolvers and outlasses—for the duties devolving upon Captain Kent may require their use—to capture American vessels caught fishing within the three mile limit, to arrest any vessel found to have been smuggling, to take up and destroy lobster traps left after the time fixed by law has expired. All these duties imply force and armed force.

The discipline on board is excellent, and Captain Kent is not only beloved by his men, but respected by those with whom he comes into antagonism in the performance of his duties. An unfortunate individual who by accident or design had left his lobster traps after the time, and which have been seized and destroyed, remarked: "Well, if they have to be destroyed I would rather Captain Kent did it than anyone else, for I am sure he feels sorry for a poor beggar when he is destroying his property."

Captain Kent enjoys not only the confidence of his department, but the respect and friendship of all with whom he is brought in contact.
