Govt. Moves To Cut Tieup

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government made two moves Wednesday to reduce the shipping tie-up in the Welland Canal which has hampered the operation of the St. Lawrence Seaway for nearly two weeks.

Transport Minister Hees told the House of priority will be given to Canadian and American bulk carriers.

At St. Catharines, Paul Ellis, superintendent of the northern division of the canal, said foreign ships waiting to enter the canal will be allowed to proceed even though not properly equipped for navigating the 27 1/2 mile canal between Lakes Ontario and Erie.

Mr. Hees said Canadian and United States ships carrying, or designed to carry, bulk cargo of such items as iron ore would be able to go through the canal alternatively with other types of vessels. Thus every other passage through the canal will be a Canadian or American bulk cargo vessel.

Mr. Ellis said more than 20 foreign vessels tied-up off Port Weller at the Lake Ontario entrance to the canal because of an earlier federal ruling on equipment would be allowed to complete their voyage, but would be barred from entering the seaway for a second trip unless fully equipped.

This modern commercial fish processing plant and factory was built at Mutwal, Ceylon, by Canadian aid. Canada's Colombo Plan aid to 15 countries will cost \$50,000,000. Most aid, on a per capita basis, goes to Ceylon.

Several Charges Are Said Pending

HALIFAX (CP) — A fisheries department spokesman said Wednesday several charges will be laid in connection with a dawn raid Tuesday on illegal lobster canneries in Alberton, P.E.I.

Chief Protection Officer Forest Watson, Halifax-based director of a special fisheries squad set up last week to patrol Maritime lobstering areas, said more charges will be laid if there is evidence of illegal lobster operations elsewhere on the island.

Mr. Watson said it is not known how many charges will be laid, but he said "thousands" of undersized lobsters and three canneries. "It is customary these cases to lay charges," he said.

was illegal operations going on." He said the canneries are often moved from one house to another. "Residents of one house are apt to be working in a cannery set up in another."

He said small lobsters are more plentiful than the legal larger type.

Many of the lobsters seized were alive. But others were cooked and in the process of being canned.

An Alberton storekeeper who asked not to be identified, said officers knocked on his door at 6:30 a.m. "When I woke up, I thought it was an invasion."

RCMP Inspector E. L. Martin Charlottetown said the fisheries officers asked for RCMP support in the raid. It was up to the fisheries department to press charges, he added.

Maximum penalty for catching and processing undersized lobsters is \$1,000.

Maritimes Show Way In Charity

HALIFAX (CP) — Retiring Governor Fred MacKinnon of Rotary district 782 said Wednesday many Maritime communities offer a challenge to Rotary in the field of public service projects.

He said any club members who are "putting on the brakes or sitting back" are setting the stage "for a slow death."

Mr. MacKinnon said Rotary membership in Nova Scotia-Newfoundland-Prince Edward Island should reach 1,200 this year. Districts stand at 1,177 and earlier Wednesday it was announced that Mr. MacKinnon will be succeeded by Dr. George Smith of Truro.

The figure is contained in the 1958-60 capital budget of the Crown-owned Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation tabled in the Commons Wednesday.

The government's recent white paper on defence said Canada would participate in the project, cost of which is expected to exceed \$1,000,000,000. However, this is the first time that the amount of Canadian participation has been made known.

Canada will pay the major share of a 1,200-mile coaxial cable link from Cape Dyer on the east coast of Baffin Island to Corner Brook Nfld.

The cable will carry signals from a radar station on Greenland to Corner Brook and then to the Norad control centre at Colorado Springs, Colo. Cape Dyer will also be hooked to the radar station by coaxial cable.

The COTC budget said the cost of the Cape Dyer-Corner Brook link will be \$19,500,000, with the U.S. paying \$8,410,000. Estimated cost of work to be carried out this year by COTC will be \$5,550,000.

Canada To Aid In Cable Building

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada will contribute \$11,000,000 toward construction of the eastern Arctic section of a United States radar warning system against ballistic missile attack.

Reason Found For Big Hole

HALIFAX (CP) — An investigation reported Wednesday that water-weakened limestone or gypsum apparently gave way and caused a 50-foot deep hole last week in a Cape Breton farmfield.

The hole swallowed two horses and nearly caught a 12-year-old boy.

Deputy Nova Scotia Mines Minister Dr. J. P. Nowlan said a report on the earth collapse came from Gordon Cranton, a teacher at Frizzleton, N.S. Mr. Cranton was asked by the mines department to investigate the hole on the farm owned by Martin Murphy about 10 miles from Baddeck.

The report said the area is underlain by limestone and gypsum. In the area of the hole it is impossible to tell which mineral is predominant because of sand and gravel deposits.

Several other smaller sink-holes were found nearby.

Dr. Nowlan said "that type of cave-in is not uncommon. There is always a danger of cave-in where there is any underground formation of Gypsum or limestone and there is water flowing."

This applied over an area of several hundred square miles in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Murphy was harrowing the field with his son, Hugh, when one of the horses began sinking into the earth. Mr. Murphy grabbed his son just as he started to slip in. He said he would not go near the field until he knew whether further collapses might occur.

Mr. Murphy said Wednesday night he disagreed with Mr. Cranton's report. He said in an interview he went down in the hole Monday and found no evidence of gypsum — "Nothing but good, solid, hard gravel."

Later free all-German elections to reunify the country.

In a zone yet to be determined Europe, ground control and inspection of both sides armed forces would be instituted.

Free elections would be carried out in both East and West Berlin, as a pilot plan for later German reunification.

During this first phase, the sources said, the United States and Russia would each limit its armed forces to 2,500,000 men.

Germany would be reunited on the basis of free elections to be controlled either by the big four—United States, France, Russia and Britain—or by neutral powers, or by the United Nations.

WOULD HAVE CHOICE

The reunited Germany would have the choice of joining either the Atlantic Pact or the Communist Warsaw Pact, or of remaining neutral.

A zone of inspection would be set up, covering East and West Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

In this area, ceilings would be imposed on the size of both sides' armed forces.

At the beginning of this phase, was reported the armed forces of the United States and Russia could each be limited to 2,100,000 men to be reduced later to 700,000.

3. Main feature of this phase as said to be the signature of a peace treaty with the reunited Germany.

The peace treaty would define Germany's final frontiers. Though the plan did not mention where these frontiers should be, it was understood all the Western powers were prepared to accept the Oder-Neisse line as Germany's border in the East.
