Obituary Notice

RALPH COLLINS

On August 27th, 1959, the residents of Newtown Cross and surrounding districts were shocked and saddened to hear of the sudden death of Ralph Collins after a brief illness.

He had been a faithful and obliging mail courier in the district for more than a quarter of a century and made his last trip on the 24th.

On the evening of the 25th, his doctor ordered him to the Charlottetown Hospital. Before leaving home he was visited by his pastor, Rev. Leonard McKenna who administered the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church of which he was devout member. He lived for only a few hours after entering the hospital where all medical aid could provide failed to revive him, and he passed peacefully away at an early hour on August 27th.

Ralph was born at Montague, July 19th, 1887, and lived there the earlier part of his life. In 1917 he married Blanche Cody, of Newtown Cross and a few years later came with her to her former home to care for her aged parents.

Besides his sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn a son Vincent of Allston, Mass., a daughter Kathryn, Mrs. John Burke of Toronto, also one son Lawrence who predeceased him. Five grandchildren and three sisters, Helen, Mrs. Michael Naddy, Newtown Cross, Frances, Mrs. Joseph Power, Edney Street, Charlottetown, and Edith, Mrs. Charles Upham, Maiden, Mass. One sister, Alice, Mrs. William Roberts predeceased him.

His funeral which was largely attended was held at St. Michael's Church, Iona, where Requiem High Mass was sung by his pastor Rev. Leonard McKenna, who also conducted services at the grave.

Pall bearers were David Ross, Bennett Gillis, John A. Murrison, Joseph Henry, Monty Kelly, and Michael Morrissey.

PROSPERITY AND SOME OF ITS PROBLEMS - WELL-BALANCED POLICIES REQUIRED

ANOTHER YEAR OF PROGRESS FOR THE BANK

(Extracts of addresses by the President, Mr. J. Ubald Boyer, and the General Manager, Mr. Léo Lavoie, at the 50th Annual General Meeting of Shareholders of The Provincial Bank of Canada.)

"A great deal of attention and interest has revolved lately around the monetary situation. After the central bank had increased the money supply in 1958, to check the recession, it decided, once the recovery was well under way, to stabilize the bank's cash reserves in order to prevent any inflationary developments. These reserves, after having increased by more than \$100 millions in 1958, have since remained almost stationary around the \$1 billion level. In order to meet the loan requirements of their customers, banks found it necessary to liquidate some of their bonds, at prices which generally involved losses. Almost \$1 billion was obtained in this way and loaned to commerce, industry and agriculture.

References often are made, however, to credit restrictions as in 1956-1957, even if commercial loans did not rise at that time nearly as rapidly as this year. As a result of persistent demands for credit, money is scarce and consequently has become dearer than at any time during the last thirty years - although, in the case of Canadian banks, the rate is limited by law to 6%. Obviously, business men are no longer accustomed to conditions of this kind, which they used to consider quite normal in periods of prosperity. While they formerly condemned easy money in the interest of sound money, they are inclined to consider it as almost a necessity today."

"... This leaves unsolved the question as to whether we can enjoy, at the same time, the benefits of full employment and a stable currency... Once the war economy was liquidated, we had a four-year period, from 1952 to 1955 inclusive, when prices were remarkably stable... Signs of weakness then emerged in our economy and twice during the last four years there was definite government action. If on one hand the benefits of full employment were secured in this way, there has already been on the other hand a rise of almost 10% in the cost of living. This means a decline of more than 8% in less than four years, in the purchasing power of our money. It would be impossible to stop this devaluation process if both labour and business were to insist that a full-employment economy be maintained through policies requiring no effort or personal sacrifices. The day is nearing, however, when it will have to be fully acknowledged that traditional virtues still have some meaning, even in these times when technology has altered so many concepts. It seems that after all a fair balance between saving and consumption is an essential element for the ultimate success of any economic long-term planning..."
