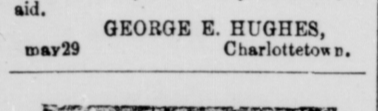

Of 250 vessels in New York Bay, when notice was given of the September storm, only one ventured to disregard the signals. One of these put back after reaching Sandy Hook; the other kept on, and arrived in port five days overdue, in a badly crippled condition. CHEQUE BURNED TO A CINDER.

But There Was Enough of It Legible to the Bank Cashier.

Many curious stories have been told concerning bank cheques. Some of these relate to the largest drawn, and others to the smallest. One of the largest cheques ever drawn in this country was at the time that the capital of the Nevada bank was increased from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000. This cheque was by Flood & O'Brien, for \$2,660,000. As to the extreme, cheque has been drawn to the value of a single cent. Other stories relate to the circuit made by cheques before they are finally taken up and destroyed.

Some of these migrations have covered different states and hundreds of miles. In these journeys cheques have gone over ground several times. Cheques are wonderful money-savers—that is, if they save the holder a vast sum of money every day. They also serve to minimize the loss of money from mistakes, thefts or other causes.

But one of the greatest curiosities in the cheque line has just come to light in this city. A lady brought it to the Bank of California to be cashed. It was in a paper box, and had to be handled very carefully, for it was a two-piece, and both were burned to a crisp.

There was not a decipherable word on either cheque. The lady said she had been drawn to the value of \$125, which she had received in a letter. The cheque, she said, was drawn by the National Bank of California, of Sacramento. She had removed the letter from the envelope and thrown the envelope on some coals in the grate. Upon reading the letter, she found a reference to an enclosure of cheques for the same name, and turned to the fire in the grate with some disappointment. The fire had done its work. The crisp paper lay in the grate. She carefully removed the same, placed it in a box and hurried to the Bank of California to get it mended before the pieces were further crumpled. After inspection of the matter, the officers of the bank made a careful examination of the burnt paper, and by the aid of powerful glasses they were able to make out portions of words from the most impressive parts of the paper. There was enough of these lines left to show that "Elle had been written and part of the words "thousand" and "and made out with two or three letters of the name of the bank. These discoveries corresponded with the story of the lady, and the bank officers then commenced to search for the original cheque.

The circumstances of the case were forwarded to the money order department. The department was charged about the curiosity of the case. Had there been more curiosity about the inclosure of the envelope, the trouble would have been avoided. The practical application of the story is to be careful that what you throw into the fire has no further value to you.—San Francisco Bulletin.

VEGETARIANISM.

Some Celebrated People Who Eat No Animal Food.

"The future is with the vegetarians," said Prof. Virchow, Germany's greatest medical scientist, some time since when he was invited to give the address "What will people eat in the future?" It is interesting to note how many distinguished people belong to the class of vegetarians.

Vegetarianism will represent among people who wield the pen, Count Leo Tolstoy, the strange man, amidst the dreary wilds of Russia a prodigious reader, the work of which declares that for years he has not polluted his lips. Ouida, the novelist, finds a fruit diet essential to successful fiction writing, and the brilliant-minded reasoning of Mrs. Mona Caird flourishes on the same sustenance, as does the scholarship of Prof. Mayor, who amazes Cambridge by showing how much learning can subsist upon lunches of no more substantial food than a piece of bread and an apple.

The Professor is an enthusiastic vegetarian, and declares that he never thinks of meat, and that he has no greater energy than fresh feeding.

"Vegetarianism is, indeed, not identical to acute thinking, Edison, the inventor, is an example. The food which enters the laboratory in which the great worker immures himself for days and weeks at a time almost suggests its security and simplicity. The inventor has discovered some mode of obtaining nutrition from the atmosphere. Fruit, bread and milk he declares to be the material upon which he thinks best.

Sir James—afterwards Lord—Hannan attributed the retention of his extraordinary powers of work, in spite of his advanced age, to the fact that he had ruined the constitution of "three men," as a brother judge put it, in his never allowing a particle of flesh-food to pass his lips.

"I owe much to vegetarianism," once declared that popular wielder of the brush, Hubert Herkomer. Herkomer's father was a vegetarian of the strictest kind, as is Mr. Bruce Joy, one of our most favored sculptors, the producer of the celebrated Bright statue which Liverpool boasts among its art treasures.

One of the hardest workers in our islands is Sir Isaac Pitman, the man to whom the world owes the perfection of phonography. He works ten hours a day on a vegetarian diet.—Pearson's Weekly.

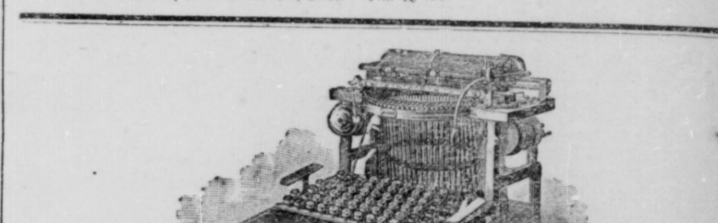
