EVERY effort is being made to recover the body of Howard Farrow, the victim of the boating accident at Summerside on Friday last. At the time of the accident twenty-one cases of lobsters were thrown overboard from the boat to lighten her, as it was supposed she was sinking. During Saturday and Sunday nineteen cases were picked up on the shore near the scene of the disaster, and yesterday another case was found at McCallum's Point across the harbor about four miles from where the accident occurred. A hat, supposed to be the one worn by Farrow, was also found at the same time and place.

A FAST RUNNER.—D. W. Strong, of this city, who has been with Union Hose Company in Halifax as a substitute for Philip Frey, made a great reputation there as a runner, winning every race in which he started. It will be remembered that on Wednesday he won the 100 and 225 yard dashes against a large field of competitors. Thursday he entered in the quarter mile run against 18 men, and in the half mile run against an almost equally large number. He won both, making remarkably fast time. The prizes were \$50 in each. Strong is without doubt the fastest runner in Bangor, if not in Maine, and should anybody think differently they will have no difficulty in arranging a match with him.—Bangor Whig.
