

Balbo Is Winner Over Hughes As Donchin Takes Semi-final From Rothberg

Winning the only fall in a gruelling 60-minute time limit match Salvatore Balbo last night was a decision victory over Len Donchin. Hughes in the main event of the wrestling card staged at the Sporting Club.

Despite a meagre attendance, probably the smallest ever to witness a sport event in the Club since its opening, the grapplers put on another of their good performances. For over 34 minutes Hughes and Balbo mixed matters plenty before the first fall finally went to the likable Italian after he had withstood severe punishment from Hughes employing practice-Hughes. Hughes employing practice-Hughes never held he knew had his opponent in difficulty on more than one occasion but each time Balbo would wriggle clear. The tide began to turn at the 25-minute mark as Balbo caught Hughes with a flying tackle as he came off the ropes fast; Hughes was weakened by the unexpected attack and for the remainder of the fall was in trouble and finally had his shoulders pinned as Balbo came through with another flying tackle that settled the issue. Hughes' shoulders being pinned after the two wrestlers had been in the ring 34 minutes and 58 seconds.

The fans saw plenty of action and big time grappling as the two men, the fastest pair ever to display their wares in a local ring, wriggle out of holds continually for the 34 minutes and 58 seconds the match lasted. But neither could pin the others shoulders and as the timers going signified the end of the time limit set for the match Balbo's hand was raised in victory by referee Curly Donchin.

DONCHIN TAKES SEMI-FINAL

"Curly" Donchin made his first appearance here a winning one as he took the semi-final on the card with a straight two-fall victory over rugged Abe Rothberg, also making his initial appearance. Donchin having his opponent in difficulties in the opening minutes of the first fall saw Rothberg make a comeback that nearly had him out as he applied three wrist locks in quick succession before Donchin could get away from the hold. As the two grapplers started to mix matters Donchin suddenly caught Rothberg with a series of flying tackles that weakened sufficiently to make him an easy target for a body press that saw his shoulders pinned to the mat after 15 minutes and 10 seconds of wrestling.

But if the fans had seen rugged action during the first fall they were treated to an overdose in the second fall that was again won by Donchin. Again the winner of the bout had to stage a startling comeback. Using everything at his command in an attempt to win the fall and square

the match Rothberg hammered Donchin all over the ring with smashes to the face and body; at times the match resembled fighting far more than wrestling but Donchin, apparently able to withstand terrific punishment suddenly smashed back with an attack of his own. Getting Rothberg on the ropes a right to the jaw sent Rothberg flying onto the floor; three times this was repeated as the loser attempted to climb back into the ring and on his third trip outside the ring he was unable to climb back in time and referee Joey McDonald raised Donchin's hand in token of victory.

Somerville Passes From U.S. Amateur Picture As Result Of 6 And 5 Defeat

CHICAGO, Sept. 14-(AP)—Little Ray Billow of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., produced the biggest triumph today as the semi-finals bracket was completed in the 43rd National Amateur Golf Championship at North Shore Country Club when he disposed of Canada's last challenger.

Billow's 6 and 5 defeat of C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville of London, Ont., champion in 1932, was the most decisive victory of a quarter finals program which saw the advance of three different sections of the United States—Don Schumacher of Dallas, Texas, Art Doering of Chicago, and (Bud) Ward of Spokane, Wash.

Billow's game against Somerville was as hot as the plus 90 degree temperature which baked the North Shore Course. On the outgoing nine he had a medal 31, five under par and a remarkable score considering that only one putt was conceded, and that of two feet. At the turn he was five up on the Canadian entry, and he ended the match by winning the 11th with a par four to Somerville's bogie five and halving the next two holes.
