## Hostess Wins Court Decision

PARIS (Reuters)—A Paris appeal court ruled Tuesday in favor of an Air France hostess who says a company rule that hostesses will be fired if they marry is "immoral" and "forces them to live in concubinage" if they want to keep their jobs.

The court awarded Mrs. Anne-Marie Berber, a former hostess dismissed by Air France when she married in 1953, 10,000 francs (\$2,000) damages, plus 3,900 francs (\$780) for lost wages.
