

Seaweed Research Is Urgently Needed

HALIFAX (CP)—A long-term research program is urgently needed to aid the development of the seaweed industry in all nations, Dr. F. N. Woodward, director of the Arthur D. Little Research Institute, Inveresk, Scotland, said here Wednesday.

Dr. Woodward, addressing the fifth international seaweed symposium during its opening session at Dalhousie University, said there is not enough information available to investigate trends of the industry.

Attacks on the government were coming from all directions during the meeting. One clergyman said the situation was an example of "democracy going out the window."

Angry Athena Ratepayers Consider Protest March

SUMMERSIDE — Amid calls of "we might as well be living in Cuba", "ask for the government's resignation", and "tear down the liquor store", approximately 500 enraged ratepayers of the Athena Regional High School District showed their desire to fight the government to the end in the question of the proposed retail liquor store site on Granville Street North.

Both the executive council and the liquor commission were invited to last night's meeting. A negative silence hung over the auditorium when the chairman asked if a representative from either was present.

The chairman, Edwin Lewis, read the following questions which were to be put to representatives of the council and commission had they accepted the invitation.

How extensive was the survey of opinion on the location of the liquor outlet as suggested by the Summerside Board of Trade? Why was there not a public notice of tenders for construction of said building as in the case in Cardigan District?

How is it possible that in one case the government can reverse the action and in another case they say it is not possible? Mr. Lewis said that a number of proposals had been brought in by the citizen's committee.

U.S. Casualties Highest Of War

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. military headquarters disclosed Wednesday 59 Americans were killed in action against Viet Cong guerrillas in South Viet Nam last week. The U.S. toll, which included losses in the conquest of the Van Tuong Peninsula, was the highest in any seven-day period of the war.

N.B. Man Dies In Cave-In

BARKERVILLE, B.C. (CP)—A New Brunswick man has died under tons of sand in a cave-in near this historic gold mining centre 260 miles north of Vancouver.

MORE MISSILES?

The statistics came out as a U.S. spokesman reported the loss of a third American plane to what appeared to be a surface-to-air missile over North Viet Nam, this time about 90 miles south of Hanoi.

AIR STRIES CONTINUE

In continuing air strikes north of the border splitting Viet Nam, 24 U.S. Air Force Thunderchiefs executed a half-dozen missions before dawn Wednesday. A spokesman said they expended 51 tons of bombs and rockets.
