(Continued from page 1) and said that unless the company was given the right to operate as conditions required, the railway would be hampered in its efforts to better existing service.

"Our case is a simple one. We want to operate in a manner designed to answer local needs and problems."

### EXPLAINS PLAN

The new concept in land transportation hinges on an integration of express and less-than-carload freight services. There would be, Mr. Gillespie explained, one department, one set of rates, one solicitation force, one form of documentation.

To assist the distribution of traffic, railroads have been established throughout the Maritimes. The railroad plan involves the dispatch to one central point cars containing traffic for as many as 35 communities.

In some instances the traffic moves in trailers on flat cars. In others, it moves in boxcars and in still others, it moves in high-speed box-baggage cars on passenger trains.

At the distributing point the cars or trailers are unloaded and the traffic handled in highway vehicles. "The integrated service will reduce delays in transit, eliminate costly wayfreight handlings, and reduce or eliminate small shed processing," Mr. Gillespie said.

### FASTER SERVICE

Operating in the other direction, that is, from the island, the new service would enable the railway to rush P.E.I. produce to the railheads where fast, manifest, non-stop freight and express trains would speed it to central Canadian markets.

"This, for example, will enable potato or vegetable growers to compete more effectively with U.S. suppliers."

Canadian National already employs 1,000 persons in Prince Edward Island, and provides an annual salary approaching \$5 million. In addition, hundreds of Islanders receive pension checks.

Any persons employed by the railway's trucking arm would swell this figure. "But," Mr. Gillespie said, "if we are not able to introduce this new service, the railway would be placed on an unequal footing with its competitors, and you could well lose much of that which you already have."

He added: "We ask only for the opportunity to present the people of Prince Edward Island with a transportation service superior to anything they have at present."

He emphasized that the railway, through its trucking arm, was not attempting to create a transportation monopoly.

"A look at the figures will show you that CN has only two to three per cent of the total trucking business in this country."

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says snow will begin in northwestern New Brunswick and spread eastward. Rain will begin in southern Nova Scotia this morning, preceded by a brief period of snow or freezing rain, while a mixture of snow and rain is forecast for northern Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and southern New Brunswick. Snowfall amounts will be small, and clearing weather will return to most regions by late today.

### Regional forecasts:

Halifax and vicinity, South Shore, Eastern Shore: Overcast with rain beginning during morning preceded by a brief period of snow or freezing rain; rain ending by evening; turning milder; south winds 20. Low-high at Halifax and Yarmouth 18 and 30, Goshen 5 below and 30 above.

Annapolis Valley, Northern Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island: Overcast with snow, mixed with rain or freezing rain at times, beginning during morning and ending by evening; milder; south winds 20 shifting to west 20 in afternoon. Low-high at Kentville 10 and 35, New Glasgow 5 below and 30 above, Sydney 10 and 30, Charlottetown 5 and 30.

Eastern N.B. counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Overcast with snow mixed with rain or freezing rain at times and ending in afternoon, clearing by evening; milder; southwest winds 20, shifting to west 20 in afternoon. Low-high at Edmundston 5 below and 30 above, Campbellton 5 and 20.

Bay of Fundy: Southwest winds 25 shifting in afternoon to northwest 30; mainly overcast, with rain beginning during morning. Visibility 10 miles lowering to one to three miles in rain; milder.

High tide today at Charlottetown at 12.54 p.m. and 11.57 p.m. At Rustico at 9.22 a.m. and 7.03 p.m. Summerside tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 7.17 and sets at 5.05.

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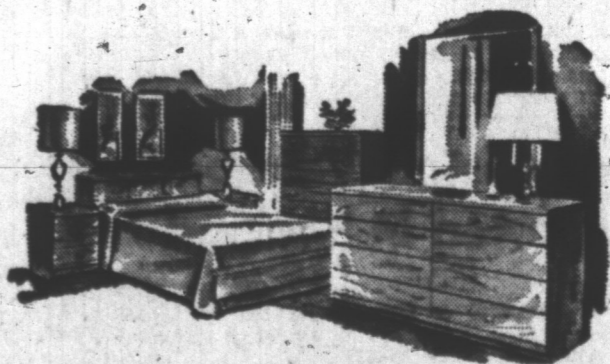
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
