JUDGE HONORED.—In the case of the contended will of Charles Nevins, before Judge H. C. McInerney in the probate court this morning, Daniel Mullin, K. C., began his argument for the contestants of the will. He will continue this afternoon. Before argument started, Mr. Mullin and J. F. H. Teed, who also appears in this case arose to congratulate Judge McInerney upon his appointment as King's Counsel, and told of appreciation of his receipt of this honor. Judge McInerney, in reply, said that he felt himself unworthy of the honor, but appreciated it very much, especially in view of the fact that it had come unlooked for and without intimation before the arrival of the official notice this morning from the deputy provincial secretary, and also in view of the fact that the appointments were now made by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council on the recommendation of the chief justice of the King's Bench division of the Supreme Court.—John Telegraph. P. E. I. BIBLE SOCIETY—This department opened for the summer on May 1. A new course of Scripture Memorizing, previously prepared by a committee appointed for that purpose for use in the Sunday Schools of the Province, includes all scholars, and is arranged from four to eight and the other for those from nine to fifteen years of age and over. Miss Charlotte Whitton of the Social Service Council of Canada is at present, speaking in many places on the Island and stirring us up to the great need of immediate action in social work. She dwells on the interdependence of rural and urban life and of the responsibility of the one towards the other. The city-ward movement from rural communities makes it imperative that the rural communities assume the responsibility of knowing the conditions into which they are sending their young people, not only knowing the actual conditions, but realizing their responsibility for those conditions. For the same reason the East and the West are interdependent. Social problems, no matter how localized they may seem, carry us out beyond the bounds of our own community, of our own province, even of our own country. Science has brought us nearer to Europe than in our father's time were the other provinces of Canada. How many realize when we read of the murder of a prince in Serbia that as a result war would take its toll from our homes, or when we heard of Spanish influenza spreading over Europe that the remotest farm of Prince Edward Island would not be immune? We no longer live in water-tight compartments. We are our neighbours' keeper—in our own interest—and our neighbour may live as far away as Russia and China.

Two distinct lines of action must be considered in social work: First, the elimination of those influences and forces that tend to the breaking down or destruction of the mental, moral and physical fibre of the community and the nation; and, secondly, the constructive work that implants and nourishes those ideals and characteristics that will enable every individual in the community to develop his highest potentialities. In pursuing these ends we must concentrate on the child; his health, that it may be properly equipped; its training that it may know how to use those powers with which it is endowed; its environment, that we may put no stumbling block in the way of its development. On the Island the immediate need for the conservation of the health of the child is the establishment of a provincial Board of Health, which is lacking in P. E. I., alone of all the provinces of Canada. No adequate health effort of any kind is possible without such a central organization to assume res-

responsibility for the knowledge of scriptural subjects. This affords a chance to the Women's Institutes, the churches and other organizations to make a very practical contribution to this phase of social work. The Island is particularly behind in preventive and remedial work alike, of the neglected, dependent and delinquent child. And in this special field of work, great strides can be made in the Island without heavy financial outlay and without elaborate machinery. Prince Edward Island possesses the essentials of children's protection legislation in these groups, but sufficient public interest and support to obtain the enactment and promulgation that make these laws of a degree, that the government, when approached, is inactive because the measures requested do not seem to be of practical interest to the voting public. Meanwhile boy and girl delinquents, delinquent in a heavy percentage of cases, because of home conditions and circumstances, are sent for offences, which are the result in many cases of their lack of training to mix and herd with adult, criminals. Consequently they become, due to society's treatment of them, more hardened in crime than before the Province took any action. These children should not be treated with the machinery of the law and crime provided for adults, but should receive special consideration and a second chance in proper training schools or homes. Prince Edward Island can, if it desires, obtain this service for its young offenders. Simply by co-operation with institutions in other provinces, one of which at least has offered to receive any boys committed from the Island into its excellent home, if the Government of the Island will only take the matter under review. In the proper treatment of neglected and dependent children now left in poor homes to add to our delinquents, our poor and our criminals, starved in body and soul, beggared for clothing and for character, the Island requires only the interest and activity of its citizens to make its Children's Protective Act operative, and to permit for the banding together of interested, patriotic citizens in the Island committees into Children's Aid Societies, to guarantee that no child in any community of the Island shall lack those first essentials of decent childhood and citizenship: a wholesome, moral, decent home and home life.
