LAVAL.—A Quebec despatch says in Catholic circles it is rumored that Mgr. Taschereau has succeeded in obtaining for the Propaganda aid for the Montreal branch of the Laval University. Some months ago the Laval authorities decided to close this branch, as no aid for its support could be obtained from Rome. Now the Rev. Mr. Hamnel, Rector of Laval, announces to the Montreal professors that their engagements and salaries will continue, also that a new building will soon be erected to accommodate the faculties of law and medicine at a cost of \$50,000.

TEN to twelve thousand people were in attendance at Belmont, Pa., on the 18th inst, when Jay-Eye-See and Phallas, attempted to break the record. Jay-Eye-See beat the record for three-quarters of a mile, but for a losing break just after entering the last quarter, without doubt, would have clipped a second or more off Maud S's fastest time. Phallas failed to equal his own best performance, but he trotted the three fastest consecutive heats ever recorded by a stallion, the lowest being better than the best record of any other stallion.

SUICIDE.—On Friday afternoon, Edward Colbert, foreman of Mr. L. H. Fisher's tailoring establishment, Bridgetown, committed suicide by hanging himself in a barn. He had been rather unsteady for some little time, previous and consequently inattentive to his business, and being of an honest turn of mind, this appeared to occasion a corresponding degree of despondency. He was about forty-two years old, of more than ordinary intelligence for a man in his position, a first class workman, kind, genial and quiet, and a general favorite among his acquaintances.—Moncton Times.

ACCORDING to the returns received by the Department of Agriculture, the total arrivals of immigrants in Canada during the month of July last were 16,565. Of these more than half, or 8,707, settled in the Dominion, and 7,858 went to their original destination, the United States. During July, 1883, the arrivals were 21,706, of whom 11,109 settled in Canada. Out of a total arrival of 97,676 immigrants during the seven months from January 1st, the Dominion secured 55,294 settlers, while in the corresponding seven months of 1883 the Dominion secured 69,066 settlers, out of a total of 116,375 immigrants arriving on this continent via Canadian ports. The proportion of the total number of immigrants remaining in Canada is greater this year than last by 4 per cent.

An Important Scientific Event.

PARIS, Aug. 19. Herr Mungen has presented a report to the Academy of Science concerning the recent balloon ascension at Mendon. The balloon was under the direction of Captain Renards, and although it moved against the wind it easily followed the course along which it was steered. It was then veered around and brought back to the point from which it started. Mungen considers it a memorable event in the history of aerostatic science.

Bonner Captures Maud S.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19. The Turf, Field and Farm to-morrow will announce that Maud S. was sold to Robert Bonner, of New York, on Monday night, for \$40,000. Vanderbilt was lately offered \$100,000 for her but declined it, preferring to sell her for less than half that sum to Mr. Bonner, who he knew would not trot her in public races.
