## RCAF Member Stays As Election Candidate

**OTTAWA (CP)** - The name of Dr. Lucien Bachand, Social Credit candidate, will be on the ballot in Terrebonne constituency in the June 18 federal election, Chief Electoral Officer Nelson Castonguay said Tuesday.

Dr. Bachand a recent graduate in medicine, is an "RCAF" fight lieutenant. The Canada Election Act stipulates that any person "holding any office, commission or employment in the service of the government of Canada" is ineligible to be a candidate for Parliament. There is an exception for members of the services of active duty in wartime.

Mr. Castonguay said the decision on Dr. Bachand's name appearing on the ballot is based on a section of the Election Act which reads: "The returning officer shall not accept any deposit, until after all the other steps necessary to complete the nomination of the candidate have been taken, and upon his accepting any deposit he shall give to the person by whom it is paid a receipt therefor, which is conclusive evidence that the candidate has been duly and regularly nominated."

**STATUS NOT KNOWN**  
Should Castonguay say that in filing his nomination papers and paying his \$200 deposit, Dr. Bachand did not tell Terrebonne returning officer Paul-Emile Brunet of St. Jerome, Que., that he was a member of the RCAF.

"Since his papers were in order and he paid his deposit, the returning officer had no alternative but to issue a receipt," said Mr. Castonguay, adding that information on the doctor's RCAF connection did not become available to Mr. Brunet until last Sunday, June 10. Nominations closed June 4.

Should Dr. Bachand be elected, his eligibility to sit as an MP would be determined by the House of Commons itself.

The RCAF, which has a regulation of its own forbidding its members to seek election to Parliament, says it is studying the matter.

## New Army Dept. Is Announced

**OTTAWA (CP)** - Defence Minister Harkness announced Tuesday creation of a new army department charged with co-ordinating army spending.

To be known as the Comptroller General's Branch, the department will also study the costs of all army programs. It is to come into being Aug. 1.

## ATTENTION BOARDS OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES AND TEACHERS

Only regularly licensed teachers may now be employed for the school year 1962-63.

Persons who have been absent from active duty as teachers for five or more years, can be employed only if they undertake to attend a Refresher Course in Teaching Methods, as required by paragraph 12 of the "Regulations Governing the Granting of Licenses to Teachers."

Teachers who hold valid licenses and who have not yet obtained teaching positions for the school year 1962-63 should forward their names to the Department of Education, giving license classification, and years of experience; also indicating district area desired.

Permits-to-Teach to persons without professional training but with educational qualifications of Grade XII or better cannot be issued prior to July 5, 1962.

## Y.N.Y. Market Rocked Again By Big Drop

**NEW YORK (AP)** - The third heaviest loss of the current slump rocked the stock market Tuesday.

It was exceeded by falls on May 28 - the deepest since 1929 - and on June 14.

An estimated \$6,800,000,000 in paper values was wiped from the counterpane of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

The gold mining issues, which usually rise in a falling market, escaped the trend.

Some brokers said the market was upset by statements by President Kennedy and his top economic director, David E. Bell.

They took the stand that Kennedy's remarks at Yale University's commencement exercises Monday indicated he would hold to his own economic ideas even if businessmen didn't like them.

Kennedy and his advisers have contended that the stock market's decline came upon investor realization that stock prices had gone too high and that inflation was no longer a vital effort on the economy.

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## GOOD DEED BRINGS ASSAULT

**HAMILTON (CP)** - John Letourneau of Hamilton will probably think twice before he plays the part of a good Samaritan again.

Last time was on May 24. John was standing in a yard when he heard a child scream in pain. He rushed to the street and found a young girl trapped by her arm under a car.

He managed to lift the small foreign car and free the child but by that time her father, Giovanni Oliviero, 35, was also on the scene.

Oliviero, police told Magistrate Robert Morrison Tuesday, seemed to think that the rescuer was the driver of the car.

He started to push him about and as John retaliated, Giovanni's brother Mario appeared on the scene.

"Giovanni jumped on my back and Mario hit me with a fence post," he told the magistrate.

Magistrate Morrison found Mario guilty of assault causing bodily harm and fined him \$75 and costs. He found Giovanni guilty of a reduced charge of common assault but suspended sentence for one year on condition he paid the \$48 fine.

## Presidential Win Claimed In Peru Vote

**LIMA (Reuters)** - Fernando Belaunde Terry, 48, an ex-congressman and founder-leader of the Popular Action Party, claimed victory Tuesday in Peru's presidential election.

But, with 25 per cent of the approximately 2,000,000 votes still uncounted, political bosses in other groups warned Belaunde not to jump to conclusions. The voting took place Sunday.

Supporters of one of the three top candidates, 65-year-old Vice President Belaunde, said they were the farthest to the left of the top three candidates. The third - and farthest to the right - was Gen. Manuel Odría, 65. He was president from 1950 to 1956 and for two years before that headed the military junta that ruled Peru from 1945 to 1948.
