

### \$15 Per Acre Limit Set For Losses

Compensation to grain growers who have been unable to harvest their crops because of bad weather will not likely be more than \$15 an acre, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday.

Up to noon yesterday, 670 growers have informed the department of agriculture that they have been unable to harvest 686 acres.

Deadline for submitting claims to the department was midnight last night. All claims will be checked by staff members of the department of agriculture.

Mr. MacRae indicated that he will seek Federal assistance in modern production techniques. They are also encouraging collective farming. The govern-

### U.S. Defence contracts Provide Many Rich Plums

WASHINGTON (CP) — Every day millions of dollars in defence contracts pour out of the Pentagon — suggests for those who make the tools of war. Invariably, it's the big miners who get most of the pay dirt—in the form of huge contracts for missiles and submarines. Aircraft and computer ships and turbines. The list appears almost endless. But while the flow is enormous and concentrated heavily among the leading companies, small operators, like San Francisco to New Orleans, also share the nuggets in the form of smaller contracts for bolts and coffee, circuit breakers and repair, cog cleaning, laundry service and grass-cutting. Anyone can get a revealing glimpse of the extent of the contract in one of the best-read daily newspapers of Washington — the U.S. commerce department's Business Daily.

### Short-Term Gov't Loans Are Planned

OTTAWA (CP)—Government plans for issuing \$600,000,000 in short-term bonds and treasury bills to meet a \$200,000,000 bond debt falling due between now and Jan. 1 are outlined Friday by Finance Minister Nowlan.

The entire annual defence budget of some \$50,000,000,000 is less than 10 per cent of U.S. over-all national production, but the Pentagon is the world's biggest single market for defence goods. Procurement this year is estimated at some \$20,000,000,000—about a dozen times the size of the entire Canadian defence budget.
