The Reformatory.

SATURDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.

ACCORDING to an announcement made in the City papers, a meeting was held on Saturday evening in St. James' Hall for the purpose of considering what steps it would be best to take in order to establish a Reformatory in this city.

Col. Gray was appointed Chairman. In bringing the subject before the meeting, he expressed his regret that there was not a larger number present. The object of the meeting was one which should interest every citizen.

The Chairman then said a few words on the vital importance of the subject to the inhabitants of the Island, and on the necessity of those who had influence moving in the matter. He suggested that a report of the meeting be published, and that the editors of the city papers be requested to advocate the matter of the establishment of a reformatory in the Province.

After a little informal discussion in which it was agreed by all that the Committee proposed by Mr. Cotton be appointed by a larger meeting, the following resolution was moved by Alexander McKinnon, Esq., and seconded by W. L. Cotton, Esq., and Resolved, That a conversation be held at an early date to consider the matter of establishing a Reformatory in this Province, and that the Governor and family, Members of the Bench, members of the Bar, the Medical staff of the city, the Mayor and Council, the Clergy and others be invited to attend and that Mrs. Edward Palmer, Mrs. Carvell, and Mrs. Rowan Fitzgerald, be appointed a committee to arrange about such meeting.

A cordial vote of thanks was then tendered to the chairman, and the meeting dispersed. MARIA LAWSON, Secretary.
