

Miners Defeat Islanders In 3rd Overtime

Macey Fires Goal To End Deadlock; Series Tied 3-All

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)—Playing coach Hub Macey slapped home a goal at 10:55 of a third overtime period Wednesday to give Glace Bay Miners a 4-3 win over Charlottetown Islanders in their Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals.

The win knotted the best-of-nine series at three games each. The seventh game will be in Charlottetown Friday and the winners of the series will meet Halifax Atlantics for the league title.

For the Miners, playing without the services of Gordie Miller and Eddie Jess, it was an uphill battle all the way.

After a scoreless first period, the Miners took a short-lived lead in the second but the Islanders replied with two tallies before the period ended. They added another in the third and then the Miners came back to knot the count 3-3 and send the game into extra time.

The 10-minute overtime was scoreless and then the game went into 20-minute sudden death periods. The first was scoreless and Macey's shot came after the half-way mark of the second, or after 100 minutes of play.

Other Glace Bay scorers were Bob Cooper, Bill McCracken and Pops Backer. Charlottetown goalkeepers were Erwin Gosse, Lyle Wiseman and Buck Whitlock.

On the Glace Bay forward line were Capt. Bob Cooper, a defenceman, and Don Keeler.

On Bob Verrier's blue-line drive at the five minute mark, Jamie MacKenzie raced in on the rebound by Al Millar. Play switched to the other end and Lockhart made two sparkling saves off Whitlock. On Whitlock's second attempt, he and the goalie fell in a heap five feet outside the crease, halting play. Hub Macey, in one successive rushes, tipped the puck past the outside of the goal post, and then missed the corner of the open net.

The deceptively slow Whitlock, a master at stealing the puck off a defenceman's stick, caught Lockhart unawares on a flip from the side. The puck sailed past the goalie but fortunately for him, struck the post and flopped to a stop a couple of inches outside the goal line.

Millar saved beautifully when Bonhomme tried to pick the corner of the net at the finish of a three-man rush. Millar left two feet of the net open, then slid across to close it as Bonhomme fired.

In the closing minutes of the period, Gus Gustavson was penalized for tripping. Millar, playing very coolly in the Charlottetown cage, made a difficult save off Ken Watson.

The crowd was in an uproar almost from the start of the third period. Miners were battling desperately to get back into the game, but it was the Islanders who were first to draw the red light. At 6:08 Whitlock gave the Islanders a 3-1 lead on a play started by Palushyn and Brklacich. The Glace Bay defencemen had Whitlock closely marked, but somehow he managed to slip his check long enough to get the puck behind Lockhart.

That goal spurred the Miners to even greater efforts. At 6:47 Bill McCracken, hating the puck past Al Millar during a wild melee at the Charlottetown goal mouth. The crowd went wild when at 10:43, Miners deadlocked the score. On Bob Verrier's screened shot from the blue-line, Pops Backer was in position at the side of the net to tip it in. Neil Amadio also received an assist on the play.

When Hinchberger was penalized for owning checking Hurst, Lockhart kicked out three close-in shots.

Buck Whitlock almost won the game for the Islanders at the seventeen minute mark when he stickhandled down centre and knifed through the defence. But he was off balance and although he slapped at the loose puck as he sprang to his face, Lockhart burned it aside. It was a close call for the Miners.

Just before the bell, Islanders claimed Hurst had scored on a wing shot. No light flashed and the referees disallowed the claim. It was becoming increasingly difficult to see through the cigarette smoke.
