Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, D. C. 17.

At the last meeting of the cabinet it was decided to summon Parliament for business on January 26 h.

Five militia corps are gazetted out this week for inefficiency. Among them are the Lunenburg Garrison Artillery.

The Public Works Department have awarded a contract for an addition to Lawler's Island, Halifax, to Cairn, Laine & Co., of Quebec.

The appointment of Hon. Mr. Strong as Chief Justice of Canada, is gazetted here to-day.

Tailon's Cabinet.

QUEBEC, Dec. 17. Premier Tailon and his colleagues were sworn into office yesterday, the leader taking the post of President of the Council.

There are no other changes at present, but it is believed that Hon. H. S. Chapais, son-in-law of Sir Hector Langevin, will join the Cabinet without a portfolio, and lead the Ministry in the Upper House.

Sir Adams' Funeral.

TRURO, Dec. 17. The funeral of Sir Adams Archibald took place yesterday. It was largely attended.

The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. J. Robbins, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Calcutta correspondent of the Times says that with a view toward removing the uncertainty now prevailing domestic trade and exchange, the bank officials of the city have asked the government whether or not it intends to close the mints to the coinage of silver; and if it intends to close them, whether or not sufficiently long notice will be given of such action.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 15.—The midwife Bodwarska, in Lodz, tried for having murdered more than 100 babies, has been sentenced to one year's imprisonment. Great indignation has been caused at Lodz by the lightness of the sentence. The woman was shown to be guilty of suffocating 111 children, whose bodies were found buried in her cellar. As she had been at work of this kind of thing for nearly twenty years there is little doubt that her victims number in the hundreds. She was saved from the penalty of her crime by the powerful influence of some of her former patients.

MONTREAL, Dec. 15.—The Bank of Montreal received a telegram from London this afternoon which contained the intelligence that the list of subscriptions for the city of Montreal stock had been closed to day. This means that the stock has all been subscribed for ahead of time, as the advertised time for the closing of the subscription list was fixed for to-morrow.

HALIFAX, Dec. 15.—The refusal of the North Atlantic Steamship Association to carry steerage passengers to the United States means a great rush of immigrants to Halifax this winter. Already the incoming steamers are bringing unusually large numbers of steerage passengers for this season of the year. The weekly mail steamer "Orinoco," on Sunday brings 300, and the fortnightly boat "Carthagénia," on Saturday brings 100. Many of these immigrants will doubtless proceed to United States points.
