

CURRENT NOTES.

The condition of Prince Bismarck is much better. Nicholas Liebrich, the famous Russian sculptor, is dead.

Lord Randolph Churchill, proposes that the Khedive be deposed and tried. The Montreal Diocesan Synod has adopted a scheme for the establishment of an order of deaconesses.

The Medical Professors of Victoria, College have donated \$10,000 to carry on the war against Laval.

The report of the massacre of the staff of the British North Borneo Company in Borneo is officially contradicted.

The Amer of Afghanistan has made terms with the Shinwaris and returned to Cabul, where his troops are clamouring for their pay.

The India Legislative Council has passed the Central Provinces Land bill, which materially adds to the privileges of small land-holders.

Already about thirty suits for damages aggregating about \$750,000, have been commenced against the Board of Brooklyn Bridge Trustees.

The British Government have given Carey, the informer, the option of proceeding to one of the colonies or remaining in Dublin without police protection.

Sir Hector Langevin left Ottawa on Saturday last, on an official tour of inspection. He visited Toronto, Windsor, and Bothwell, returning to the capital on Wednesday.

The Mexican military authorities are grumbling because they had no hand in clearing out the Apaches, and because General Crook did not report his capture to them.

A feud has broken out among the Caughnawaga Indians about who is to be the chief ruler among them. No violence has occurred, but meetings have been held by each side.

The Queen's refusal to open the exhibition of Irish lace, to be held in London next week, has evoked much adverse comment; the The Prince of Wales also declined, and the Duchess of Connaught agreed to open the exhibition.

The secessions of Goschen, Lord Amthill and other whigs from the Cobden Club occasion discussion. Nobody knows whether their resignations are due to Clemenceau's expected presence at the forthcoming dinner, or to Chamberlain's presidency at the same festival.

The appointment of Lord Reay as special commissioner to the Cape of Good Hope, is a fresh proof of Gladstone's anxiety to establish concord with the Boers. Lord Reay, though an English peer, is a Dutch noble by birth and formerly a member of the Dutch Parliament. He is a man of high character, ability and independence.

The camphor tree has recently been introduced in California and promises well. It resembles the laurel somewhat. It grows well all along the coast, and one tree at Sacramento has already attained a height of thirty feet. It is easily propagated from seed or cuttings. Besides producing the well-known drug the tree is valuable as timber.

An English Syndicate for the construction of the new Suez Canal has decided to apply to the Sultan as well as the Khedive for concessions. The route selected is via Alexandria and Cairo to the Red Sea. Ship-owners representing 4,000,000 tons have joined the English Committee, and half the capital has been subscribed.

The new Roman Catholic cathedral at Kansas City is 170 feet long by 70 feet wide, and 140 feet above low water mark of the Missouri River. The base of the lantern, 150 feet high, commands a splendid prospect, and is expected to yield a profit from sightseers, unless a tornado takes a fancy to it. Connected with the cathedral is the episcopal palace.

The New York Times London special says: Lord Rostbery was offered the Vice-Royalty of India but declined it, except upon condition that the India jurisdiction bill be abandoned. Mr. Gladstone favors the measure and will support Earl Ripon's views heartily. Earl Ripon will be made a duke on his return to England, in recognition of his great services in India.

The Earl of Shaftesbury, now 83 is about to retire from business. It may not be known that the philanthropic peer is a large cap owner. More than a hundred hansom and their horses are his property. These equipages are very neatly appointed, the drivers are men selected for their conduct, and are particularly well treated, and the public feeling is one of regret that public locomotion is not more in the hands of such voyagers like the Earl.

Charles H. Billar, aged 19, on the 21st instant, saved the lives of Henry Benedict and his two daughters from drowning at Coney Island. It was an act of heroism. All were unconscious when the brave young man landed them on the surf, and he sank unconscious beside them. Prompt medical attendance fortunately resuscitated all four. Mr. Benedict is a wealthy merchant of Philadelphia and was profuse in offers of remuneration to young Billar, which the latter modestly declined.

The railway sleeping car has in many respects taken the place in modern travel of the old-time inn, and if the traveller sleeps without being

the train he should have all the protection that would be afforded him at a hotel. A decision was recently given in the States that a passenger whose money is stolen while he is asleep in a sleeping car is entitled to recover from the railway company the amount stolen. The court took the ground that when a company charges an extra price for furnishing "sleeping facilities to travellers," the company is bound to protect them while asleep.
