work would be completed before the Ferry Service went into operation on May 1, next.

Instructions to "follow up" resolutions passed at a previous meeting of the council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade were issued to Secretary W.L. Higgins.

Resolutions passed previously included one urging "that arrangements be made forthwith for the establishment of a double daily mail and passenger service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland". The preamble of the resolution pointed out among other things that "a highly satisfactory regular air mail and passenger service has been conducted between Moncton, New Brunswick and Summerside and Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island during the past ten years".

Mainland Press Features Island Visit

Newspapers throughout the continent featured Wednesday's Royal Visit to Prince Edward Island. The following is from the account given by Douglas R. Oliver in the Toronto Globe and Mail.

With the same sweeping success that has characterized all their appearances before the Canadian people, His Majesty and his charming Queen won the full-measured acclaim of Prince Edward Island people whose loyalty and patriotism can best be measured in terms of quality rather than quantity.

And yet this year June day, 35,000 of them, swarming the professional route of the Royal couple from the Maritime Wharf landing through the Legislative ceremonial, toured streets, and backed again to harbor rendezvous, turned out to lift their cheers to the high heavens in defiance of scudding clouds and intermittent heavy showers, and in utter contempt for those who said beforehand that the P. E. demonstration could be but "antidemic".

Five thousand screaming school children, assembled from all parts of the province by five special trains and more buses than could shake a stick at, added to the spontaneous spirit and thrill of this gala day for Charlottetown.

Their staid parents, their swept posts of observation, until their Majesties appeared, appeared on the pillared balcony of the old and distinguished seat of local Government. Then they broke bounds, and completely filled and over-ran the main thoroughfare up to the Parliament building, crowding close on the heels of the Royal professional cars, and cheering and singing until their faces became beet red.

Later, when word leaked out from the Confederation chamber (where Their Majesties signed the visitors' book, heard the Provincial and civic addresses, and met Premier Campbell's Cabinet ministers and their wives) that it was possible that the Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret previously included one urging "that arrangements be made forthwith for the establishment of a double daily mail and passenger service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland".

Historic Sites To Be Marked

OTTAWA, June 16—Recommendations for the marking of nineteen historic sites of national importance were approved at the annual meeting of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada, held in Ottawa from May 29 to June 1.

Among the memorials to be erected this year are seven bronze tablets to follow the address of Confederation who were associated with Prince Edward Island: George Coles, third Premier of Prince Edward Island, 1861-1864, 1865-1869; John Hamilton Gray, C. M. G., Premier of Prince Edward Island, 1863-1865; Thomas Heath Hayland, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, 1870-1874; Andrew Archibald Macdonald, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, 1874-1879; William Henry Pope, Judge of Prince Edward Island, 1879-1879, and Edward Whelan, journalist and active advocate of free land, free schools and responsible government. Arrangements are being made to unveil the tablets next year when Prince Edward Island will celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Charlottetown Conference, the first of the conferences of the Confederation of the Provinces and the Dominion of Canada.

Present plans also include the marking of the following historic sites: at Fredericton, N. B., a monument will be erected to commemorate the establishment of the first Ministry of Health in the British Empire, 1818; at McGill University, Montreal, P. Q., a tablet to commemorate the public services of Lord Rutherford in the field of science; at Oranienburg, Ontario, a monument to commemorate the treaties made in 1798, 1815, and 1818, whereby the Indian tribes surrendered the ancient country south of Lake Simcoe, and at Jasper, Alberta a monument to the Overlanders of 1862. Additional civic addresses will be presented in other parts of the Dominion.

FOOD PRICES IN CONCESSION AREA SOAR

Japanese Blockade Enters Fourth Day—Serious Situation Looms.

TIENTSIN, June 17—(Saturday)—The Japanese blockade of the British and French concessions entered the fourth day today with Japanese urging Chinese to bring independent pressure on the British authorities and to Japanese demands for a concession.
