SUSPECTED INFANTICIDE.—Yesterday evening the Police were informed that the body of a dead infant was discovered under the rear kitchen of Mr. E. Love, Bayfield Street. From information obtained a servant girl, apparently twenty years of age, named Roper, was arrested. She confessed having placed the infant under the kitchen where it was found. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Insurrection in Afghanistan. A Bloody Battle Fought. RUSSIA THE INSTIGATOR. LONDON, June 30. A despatch from Teheran, Persia, says the rebel leader Azonb Khan, son of the ex-Ameer, is leading the insurrection against the present Ameer at the instigation of the Russians. He marched an army from Turkestan into Afghanistan, and after a bloody battle captured and looted the city of Khamsbad, and obtained among other things one million pounds sterling. It is feared serious complications are arising out of the insurrection. An Important Decision. WINNIPEG, June 30. The Supreme Court has given a decision in an appeal case, deciding that the Stipendiary Magistrate of the Northwest Association, with a Justice of the Peace, and a Jury of six, have power to try for capital offences and inflict death penalties. This is important inasmuch as had a contrary decision been given, Riel and the other prisoners would have to be removed from Regina to Winnipeg or the Eastern Provinces for trial. The appeal was made on behalf of a man convicted of murder at Moose Jaw. His lawyers will carry the case to the Privy Council. The Halifax Battalion Preparing to Come Home—Drowned. MOOSE JAW, June 30. General Middleton has ordered the Halifax Battalion to concentrate at this place, and make preparations to leave for home. The "boys" will probably leave in a few days. One of the troops, named Muhlig, was drowned while bathing here. He was a young man, and was only married three weeks before leaving Halifax. Canada's Most Successful Loan. OTTAWA, June 30.
