We believe the Prince County Hockey League has had more injuries to players this season than is usual. This may be coincidence, or it could be that the boys are getting off with more rough play than usual. For two or three games there was a rash of penalties, averaging over 20 per game, but this was largely in the junior series, and for the most part in the P.C.H.L. Penalties have been kept at a minimum. If the trend towards those serious injuries continues, players who are working will think twice before taking up the game. There is no compensation for injuries in the P.C.H.L.

In closing, a word of congratulation to a band of peewees who travelled down to Civic Stadium from Tignish, and defeated the Summerside Pee-wees in their own ball-wood. They played surprising good hockey for their years.

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Royals Storm From Behind To Nip Summerside Aces

SUMMERSIDE — Sandy's Royals invaded Civic Stadium here last night in the first game of the best of seven Island Intermediate "A" playoffs against Pope Motor Aces and returned home with a 4-3 come-from-behind victory.

The Royals dropped three goals to the Aces before getting on the score board and for a while it appeared as if the Charlottetown pucksters were in for a trouncing.

The situation changed in the third period however, as the Royals triggered three unanswered markers after they had counted their first one late in the second.

Dave Lawlor scored the winner at the 16:55 mark after he had knocked down a high pass from Dick Carroll.

Without less than a minute remaining in the final frame Angie Carroll of the Royals, picked up a penalty and the Aces attempted to take advantage of the situation by pulling their goalie in favor of an extra forward, thus giving them a two-man advantage. The move failed to pay off and the local crew had to settle for a 4-3 setback.

Two Golf Pros Get \$100 Fines

PALM BEACH GARDENS, Fla. AP) — Doug Sanders and Paul Bondeson were slapped with \$100 fines Monday for violating PGA tournament regulations by tournament supervisor Jack Tuthill.

Sanders was fined for violation of two sections of the code of ethics in the PGA tour regulations.

In published remarks attributed to him following his disqualification from the Pensacola Open March 5 after failing to sign his second round score card, Sanders was critical of the PGA and its supervisory field staff which directs the national tournaments.

Bondeson was fined for failing to honor a commitment to play in the Maracaibo Open in Venezuela March 3-6 after agreeing to compete in all three winter tournaments on the PGA Caribbean tour and accepting expense and guarantee money for doing so, the PGA said. He returned to the United States prior to the Maracaibo Open.

Both players are at the Rio Pinar Country Club, Orlando, Fla., where the \$100,000 Florida Citrus Open begins Thursday.

As far as Clay is concerned, he is defending his title. It's in the contract that this is a title fight.

And, after Clay meets George Chuvalo of Toronto here March 29 and Terrell fights Zora Foley of Chandler, Ariz., in New Orleans May 16, there will still be two champions.

Eventually the champions of both divisions will have to meet to decide once and for all who holds the crown. This may not come about for some time.

Judging by past performances, Clay and Terrell will likely still be the two men in question. Chuvalo isn't likely to dethrone Clay nor is Foley favored to upset Terrell.

Five Canadians On Dream Team

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (CP-AP) Five Canadians have been named to the 1966 Ivy League all-star hockey team, picked by the league's coaches.

The one unanimous choice was Doug Ferguson, 22, one of three brothers from Birsay, Sask., playing for Cornell, the Ivy champion. Ferguson, a forward, was league scoring leader with 31 points.

Also picked from Cornell were forward Mike Doran of Irlington, Ont., co-captain of the team with Doug Ferguson, defenceman Harry Orr of Galt, Ont., and goalkeeper Errol McKibbin of Thorold, Ont.

The other two all-stars on the first team are from Brown — forward Bruce Darling from Sudbury, Ont., and Bob Gaudreau of Providence, R.I.

Ferguson Orr and Gaudreau also made the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference all-star team, it was announced Monday in Boston.

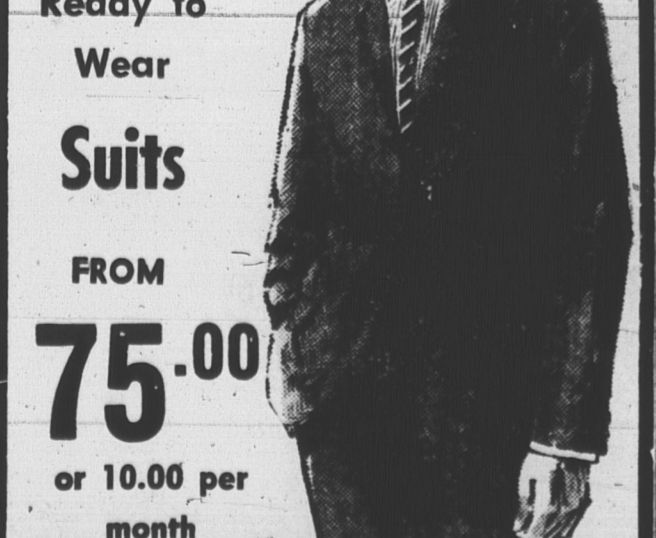
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
