'Sweet And Sour' Said Story In UN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) — It was sweet and sour in the United Nations last week—sweet just long enough to let you know how quickly things get sour.

All 82 members of the UN marched forward as co-sponsors of a disarmament resolution worked out by the Soviet Union and the United States. It was the first time it had happened in just that way.

That was Wednesday. On Friday there was a distinct chill over the so-called glass house which is the UN headquarters on New York's East River when the Soviet Union suddenly let go with a blast regarding Laos, the small Southeast Asia country which says it is the victim of aggression from Communist North Vietnam.

Russia, using the technique of a press statement, rejected the idea that it might agree to any kind of a UN-presence or representation in Laos. It said this would put the UN in an unlawful posture.

UNEXPECTED TIMING
The Soviet Union made the move at the exact moment that Western diplomats were anticipating a report from a UN Security Council subcommittee which was sent to Laos. It was there a month on a fact-finding mission, against the wishes of Russia which said the action violated the UN charter and the Soviet's power of veto.

This was to say the least—a jarring note in the atmosphere of warmth that had been generated by the East-West disarmament agreement to refer all disarmament proposals to a 10-nation committee which has parity between both power blocs and will

Chinese loses. South is subject to the hazard that East will attack the king of clubs; and if it turns out that West has the ace, the contract will go the way of all flesh.

It may be observed, the East-West cards being distributed the way they are, that the "natural" line of play fails, and in this hand declarer goes down. He may plead bad luck, and with some justification, but the fact remains that there is a far better line of play available to declarer which virtually guarantees the contract.

South should make allowance for the possibility that the queen of diamonds and ace of clubs are unfavorably located, and guard against the danger.

After winning the king of spades, he draws two trumps, cashes the A-K of diamonds, and leads the jack of spades from dummy. He does not ruff the spade. Instead, he discards a diamond.

West wins the spade, but if no longer matters how the opponents' cards are divided. The hand is certain to make regardless of what West plays next or who has what.

A club lead from West automatically hands South his tenth trick. A diamond lead is equally sure to give South an additional trick.

This is because if West has on diamond left to lead, dummy's fourth diamond becomes a trick since the suit has broken 3-3; and if West has both missing diamonds, he is bound to establish a diamond trick for declarer whether he leads the queen or a low one. A spade return would permit a ruff-discard.

The method of play suggested takes care of all contingencies. It leaves nothing to chance.
