The Canadian and American Red Cross have an agreement to supply blood free to tourists who need transfusions while on a visit.

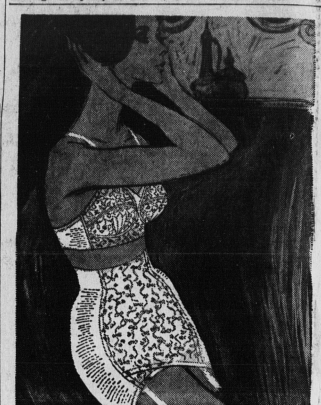

Heavy Capita Spending Being Forecast For Canada

Looking for items of significance in last week's varied batch of business news, one might pick out the annual report of the governor of the Bank of Montreal.

The governor's report, as usual, packs a remarkable amount of information in less than 100 pages and is required reading for anyone trying to keep abreast of Canada's economic affairs.

In a long-range way, one of the more interesting comments concerns the growth of international financial co-operation which has averted what otherwise might have been a number of national and international financial disasters.

"Capital spending," the magazine says, "is taking a somewhat different path than that visualized at year-end. Then it was thought that the fourth quarter marked 1962's top and that a dip was coming in early 1963. Now, with more facts in, it seems that the fourth quarter brought the dip. This year's first quarter is no worse than the \$38,000,000,000 annual rate in the final three months last year. The magazine foresees a probable \$40,000,000,000 annual rate late this year.

ACCEPT QUEBEC OFFER

In other developments of the week, Shawinigan Water and Power Company advised its shareholders that the majority of the company's directors have indicated they will accept the Quebec government's offer for their own shares. Directors made their decision, the company added, "mainly on the basis that while the offers are inadequate, the alternatives to acceptance, obscure as they now are, might produce a more unsatisfactory net result."

The Canadian Exporters' Association, following a decision made in late 1961, announces that James M. McAvity will serve as chairman of House of Seagram Ltd.

The Ontario government introduced legislation under which most Ontario employers would be required to provide a

minimum pension plan by 1965 and which would provide for portability of pensions when people change jobs.

The holdup man told Mrs. Adams to place the money from the till amounting to about \$70, in the bag, but declined to take the pennies.

When the man entered the store Mrs. Adams had been talking to her husband on the telephone, and thinking it was just another customer she told her husband to hold the line while she waited on the "customer."

The Adams' returned on Friday, March 22, to their home in Medford after attending the funeral of a relative John G. Clark, in Kensington.

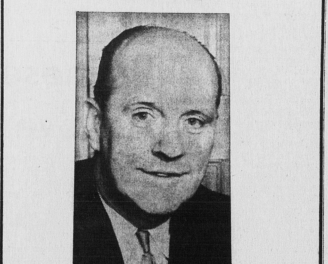

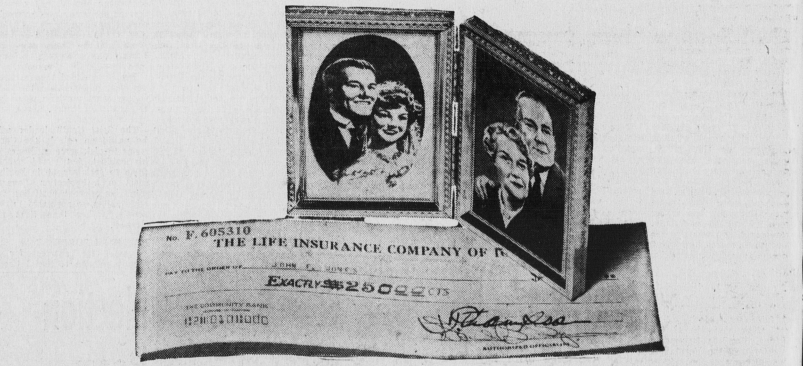
