TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, May 30.

Two clubs which went to Dudley's Grove, yesterday, had a riot, in which some 200 participated, resulting in about 50 being injured by clubs and stones, including a dozen women and two young men wounded by pistol shots.

WASHINGTON, May 30.

Secretary Blaine and Sir Edward Thornton concluded on Saturday the prolonged negotiations in regard to the outraged upon American fishermen at Fortuna Bay, Nfld., on Jan. 11th, and at a later date at Asher Bay, C. B. The American claims for losses by several fishermen aggregate \$103,000. The agreement between Secretary Blaine and Sir Edward Thornton is that the British Government shall pay \$15,000 sterling, in gold coin, and this Government will give a receipt in full. The money will probably be paid some time this week, and will be promptly distributed among the rightful owners. Nearly the whole amount goes to Gloucester, Mass.

ALBANY, May 30.

The Democrats have nominated State Senator John C. Jacobs to succeed Mr. Conkling.

Administration men met this evening. There were fifty-seven present and notes were read from thirteen more saying they will vote for the men who will support the administration.

The Democrats have nominated ex-Senator Kernan for the position vacated by Platt.

TRINIDAD, N. Y., May 30.

By an accident on the Pennsylvania railroad, at Bear Swamp, this afternoon, about one dozen persons were injured severely and a number of others slightly injured. Augustus Keller, of Philadelphia, was killed outright. Mrs. Lucrilia Pennington, of New York, aged 81, is fatally injured.
