John W. Lewis and Sons of Freetown and the Experimental Farm were also in the battle for top honors. Charlottetown Old Times Victoria, owned by the Experimental Farm was grand and senior female reserve. The Farm also had one first, placed in the class of seconds and thirds.

The Lewis of Freetown won one first, four seconds, two thirds, four fourths, two fifths and three sixths. Other top winners in the Ayrshires classes were R.R. Younker of Charlottetown R.R. 6, D.J. Mullin, St. Peter's, and the Estate of George Boswall.

Jersey Classes Edison B. Mutch, who was declared the premier Jersey breeder and exhibitor yesterday took home another long string of championships and firsts as the veteran Jersey breeder displayed his herd which is acknowledged as one of the finest in the Dominion.

The North River breeder won five championships. They were the grand and senior male and female and the junior male championships. Jester's Standard Dreamer won the grand and senior male honors for Mr. Mutch. River North Jester's Maid was the winner of the grand and senior female competition. Edeola Beaton Jester, owned by Mr. Mutch, beat out one of the bulls imported from Jersey Island to win the junior male honors.

The Jersey Island bull, showed by George MacMillan, won the junior male reserve after winning the junior yearling class. Mr. Mutch won fourteen firsts, scoring heavily in the male classes and the groups and herd. He won five of the male classes, four of the female classes, the junior and senior herd, progeny of dam, with the offspring of Creamer's Maid, the senior get of sire, and the prize for the best four females.

Other winners by Mr. Mutch were five seconds, six thirds, three fourths, two fifths and one sixth. The competition in the female classes was the toughest in the Jersey show. George MacMillan of Cornwall tied with Mr. Mutch with three firsts each. Fred Kitson of New Wiltshire had two females at the top of two classes.

Mr. MacMillan made a strong showing as he won four firsts, six seconds, four thirds, and two fourths. He also won the junior male and female reserves. Clarke Bros. of New Wiltshire was also in the running for high honors. They won the grand and senior female reserve honors with Hedgelee Anne. They also won one first, seven seconds and a number of high placings.

Jester's Chief, owned by James Vickerson of North River was the grand and senior male reserve. Mr. Vickerson won one first, four seconds and three thirds. Arthur MacDonald of St. Peter's won the junior female championship with Purple Valley Betty Jean. Mr. MacDonald only showed three head but he won one first, a second and a third.

Other strong showmen included Douglas Matheson, St. Peter's; Elmer Myers and Son, Charlottetown R.R. 1; and Miller Henderson, New Wiltshire.

Her grand performance left no doubt in anyone's mind that Mr. Callbeck has a way with horses. All the directors listed as owners have been in the racing game for some years and their horses they are now sending to the post are the successors of many others owned by them who made track history in the Province.

Some of the best vaudeville acts seen at the big Provincial Exhibition in years, thrived and amused Wednesday afternoon's race crowd. There wasn't a dull moment in the lot. It is common knowledge that Dr. J.P. Lantz is one of the busiest professional men on the Island, but notwithstanding his numerous appointments at the Polytechnic and the hospitals, he still manages to squeeze in time to act as president of the Charlottetown Exhibition Association. Though he is personally much interested in prize cattle, Jerseys preferred, his advice in all matters where the good of the Big Show is involved, is always given careful consideration. Under his leadership, the Exhibition Association has widened and activities this year, and never stood higher in public estimation. Cattle breeders in particular realize the extra efforts made to improve the cattle barns and general accommodations at the fair grounds. "Eventually peace will be restored... and the Korean people will have the opportunity to wrestle with their problems, but not on the Communists' terms."

Near the end of Wednesday's one hour and 48-minute session, Vice-Admiral J. Turner, J.C. Smith, U.N. delegate, outlined his plan for a joint subcommittee to "make recommendations as to ways and means of emerging from the present deadlock." Joy proposed the subcommittee be composed of only one member from each side with a maximum of two assistants each. They would meet informally. Joy said these recommendations would require ratification by the full delegations. Nothing was said about whether the main meeting would continue while the two-man committee was at work.

Brig.-Gen. William P. Nuckols, U.N. spokesman said the Red delegation "showed more visible interest than they have shown in any other statement."

Warns Growers Re Blight Danger

Further warning to potato growers is given by Mr. S.G. Peppin, technical adviser to the P.E. Island Potato Board who states: "The Board wishes to draw attention to Bulletin Number 5 issued by the Science Service this week which states emphatically that the weather conditions prevailing since August 9th have been ideal for the further development and spread of late blight diseases in our potato fields."

"The Seed Potato Inspection Service which is in daily contact with every district in the province reports that blight is now present in all parts of the Island. Some fields have quite severe infection whereas in others it is only now becoming established. It is possible to find some blight in practically every field."

"A serious situation might easily develop in a matter of days unless all growers take immediate steps to put on a complete and thorough coverage of spray material. If one spray seems insufficient then by all means put on another by spraying in the opposite direction. Remember, it pays to spray and this may be the one year it will pay handsome dividends."

"A continuation of the high humidity and fog which is prevailing lately or a change to a period of wet weather would quickly result in the blight reaching epidemic proportions."

"Forewarned is forearmed. Spray now and avoid unnecessary losses."

Canadian Olympic Ass'n President Visits Ch'town

Mr. A. Stanley Dawes, president of the Canadian Olympic Association, arrived here by plane last night on his first visit to this Province. He said he had always admired the Island as he frequently flew over on his way to Gander Airport which the construction firm he heads built.

As president of the Association and a Canadian representative on the International Olympic Committee he wished to meet as many prominent Islanders as possible. He stated he particularly wished to meet those people here who have taken a keen interest in amateur sport. To enable him to do this a luncheon will be given tomorrow at the Charlottetown in his honor. The host for the occasion will be Mr. J. S. Neill, Moncton, who is the N.B. P.E.I. representative of the Association. Among the invited guests will be Premier J. Walter Jones.

Mr. Dawes last night told of the setup of the Olympic Association and its methods of raising funds to finance the teams sent to the games every four years. A large slice of the money is donated by the Federal Government with the various Provinces also contributing according to their financial means. The balance is raised through subscriptions of business houses, individuals and various sport governing bodies.

A Sport Enthusiast Keenly enthusiastic about sport, although admitting his personal interest favors skiing, hockey and tennis, Mr. Dawes believes there is a definite need for encouraging youngsters to take an active part in all branches. He remarked that all wars, particularly the last one, reveal that a nation is not as healthy as it believes. Getting the young people into training where they have good food, plenty of milk and fresh air is a good way of re-building the health of the people.

Mr. Dawes who took over as president in 1946, was formerly responsible for developing many of the more popular ski trails in Quebec. Since taking on the Olympic task he has made several trips to Europe to attend the annual meetings of the International organization. He was particularly impressed with the preparations being made by Norway to handle the 1952 games. The Norwegians are building an Olympic Village

He mentioned the possibility of his resigning when next year's games are over and expects the task of carrying on to fall to Kenneth P. Farmer, secretary, Montreal, and James Worrall, vice-president, Toronto.

Mr. Dawes mentioned he was anxious to meet Miss Evelyn Henry, Southport, whose swimming of the Strait attracted his attention.

Woman Is Expert On Finest Glass

LONDON, Aug. 15 - (CP) - The major restoration work of the ancient Chapter House in Westminster Abbey was the responsibility of Miss Joan Howson, daughter of a former Archdeacon of Liverpool. She is one of the country's leading experts on stained-glass windows.

Visitors to the beautiful Chapter House where England's first parliamentarians sat have to wear slippers over their shoes for fear of scratching the precious wooden paving. It took Miss Howson and her staff of five men and three women a total of two years to glaze the four great windows of the Chapter House, as well as cleaning and repairing the fifth window and the windows of the vestibule.

Miss Howson climbed high scaffolding to do this work, although she is about 60 years of age. The old Victorian glass that was damaged in air raids made the Chapter House a gloomy place at the best, but thanks to her skill the famous shrine now is much brighter.
