## Island Odds And Ends

Autumn persists in lingering in the lap of Winter and the weather heretofore has set all sorts of new records. Nature takes little notice of the calendar when she is in the mood to play ducks and drakes with the temperature, the rains and the winds and all the other accessories at her command. Thanks to the freakish spell of midseason many construction jobs around Charlottetown have gone ahead much more rapidly than ordinarily would have been possible.

Our longshoremen always share in the loss when our potato growers have a poor year. When the price is good the movement of potatoes from the port of Charlottetown is lively and sustained. When the price is down shipping falls off and with it the work of the longshoremen. The local dock workers, represented by the L.P.U. are not making enough money this year to make a very happy Christmas. The members of the union are pulling as hard for a potato price support announcement, as any potato grower in the Province.

In a horseman's philosophy, there is always another year ahead. Nothing is ever definitely settled in the racing game, and next year winners may have been swallowed dust all through 1950. At any rate, Sam Kennedy, Roy Bevans, and others have brought some new racing stock to the Island which may scramble up the summaries a bit next summer. Nothing like new blood to keep horse-racing attractive and flourishing.

One small diesel-driven dragger operating out of Souris has opened the eyes of fishermen and fish dealers to the immense possibilities in this type of fishing. It has dawned on the biggest men in the fishing industry in the same breath that three or four draggers working continuously would swamp all the facilities for handling fish which exist at the present time in a centre such as Souris.

They estimate that six draggers would keep 250 people busy on shore and every dragger added would call for forty to fifty additional workers. That's the reason certain wide-awake men in the industry are talking about a half-million dollar plant, modelled on the lines of the one built at Caraque, New Brunswick, a few years ago.

Increased cold storage facilities, a building large enough to allow assembly line filleting of fish, another for packing and shipping, and still another in which to store at least a thousand tons of ice, are some of the units needed in the proposed plant.

Where are all the fish to come from to feed such a plant? From the finest haddock grounds in the world, which lies somewhere between Souris and Cape Breton, say Islanders who speak from confirmed knowledge.

Comparing catches landed at Gloucester the great New England fishing centre Island fishery experts point out that almost 50% of the haddock landed there are scrod, meaning small haddock 10 to 12 inches long, and of small market value. The haddock caught off Souris on the other hand run only a little over 5% scrod, which means that the marketable proportion of the catch is very high indeed.

It is because facts and figures of this nature are thrusting themselves upon men connected with the Island fishing industry, that big things are being planned in the way of new plants and facilities.

Only now, say our experts, are we beginning to realize the wealth that lies off our coasts and in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. In the Gulf itself a new fishing ground where Rose-fish abound, has been discovered, and this fish may become common in our fishing centres and of course on our tables. Gloucester, it may be said, has grown prosperous on the money derived from the Rose fish landed there.

Five years hence we may be looking back and marveling that our fishermen fooled around a few miles off shore for a hundred years while a few miles away the finest fishing grounds in the world went untapped.

Charlottetown's hockey representatives made a crashing entry into the Big Four Hockey League, and have been making most of the noise in the circuit ever since. Now and again the club has taken a licking but only to gain momentum for new victories over the startled cities of Moncton, Halifax and Saint John. Little wonder that in all three mainland towns the "club" draws overflow crowds, recognizing the "Islanders" as the greatest drawing card in down-east hockey.

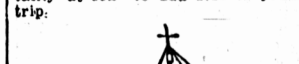

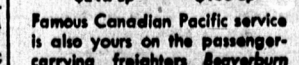

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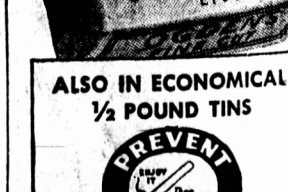
