LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Letter from Hon B. Davies.

To the Editor of The Patriot:

SIR,—In looking over your issue of 1st inst., I was surprised at the contents of your editorial epistle under the heading "Something Must Be Done."

It is a glowing description of the wicked, abandoned state of society in Charlottetown. A stranger would infer from reading that article that we are a people given to rioting and drunkenness, together with a shameful disregard of the Lord's Day.

You ask, are worshippers going to and from Church to be molested by sights and sounds out of all harmony with the religious exercises in which they have been engaged? And you attribute this abandonment of religion and law to the rejection by our citizens of the Scott Act.

I wonder, Sir, at your temerity, that a gentleman of your position, the leader of the Liberal press, would dare to disparage as you have done in a sweeping manner, your brother citizens with the infamous conduct you have attributed to them. So far as I am acquainted with the people of the town, I believe them to be generally sober, religious and law-abiding, as much so, if not more so, in proportion to their numbers than you can find in any maritime city in the Dominion. I never before heard the charge you have made, that religious people were annoyed in going and returning from church. It brought to my mind the contrast of your statement with my experience of Sunday last for the respect shown to the Sabbath was visible in passing to and returning from worship. The pleasing peacefulness reigning throughout the town denoted the mark of respect paid to the sacred day by all classes.

You go on to say that drinking on the Lord's day is simply shameful. Now, I have lived on Water Street many years, where, if anywhere, one would suppose the indulgences of drinking would prevail. I have not felt, I assure you, the annoyances you complain of on the Lord's day. I must, however, confess to having seen some five fellows, on returning from church, the worse for drinking in this street, but it occurred some two years ago, under the administration of the Scott Act.

I am not acquainted with the houses where you say liquor is retailed day and night, not excepting Sunday. I think you ought to point these places out, together with the when and where and how often religious people have been annoyed on going to and returning from church, if you can.

How to Use the Mails.

(From the Empire.)

By direction of the Postmaster-General the Chief Post Office Inspector, Mr. Sweetman, has lately been making special enquiry into certain cases in which letters and packages of more than ordinary size had been broken or torn in course of post. The chief inspector's investigations lead to the conclusion that, in the great majority of cases, the damage has been the consequence of the inferior coverings (envelopes, paper boxes, etc.) used for the articles in question. He thinks that if the public would enclose their large letters in envelopes of sufficiently good quality and of a size adapted to that of the contents, and if in making up packages they would use good wrapping paper and tie up the whole securely very few breakages would occur in course of post. It should be remembered that every letter and parcel cannot be laid in the most careful manner in the bag or box into which it has to be sorted. Post office clerks would never get through their work if they had to adopt this mode of treatment for the vast quantities of matter passing through their hands. At the same time the inspector, by Mr. Haggart's directions, is renewing the instructions to post office clerks to do all in their power to avoid damage to mail matter, and this doubtless will have a good effect. If the public would work with the post office to the extent of seeing that the articles they post are in good shape and well secured, the number of complaints would be very materially reduced.
