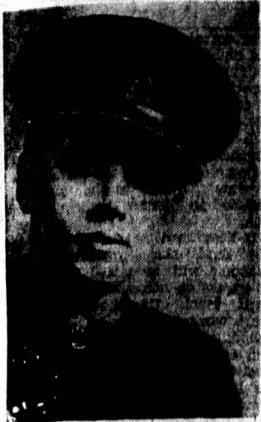


New Company Formed

(Continued from Page 1) bargaining contracts." Backs Union Tobin, the labor cabinet member and former Massachusetts governor who had previously kept out of the steel dispute, jumped into it with both feet. He told the convention delegates that he "stood heart and soul and spirit" with Murray's union. Vice-President Alben W. Barkley, who spoke only a few minutes after the demonstration subsided, said he was in no position to comment on the steel dispute nor on the legal issues of the seizure. But he told the delegates he hoped "that in the process of negotiation you will be able to come out with a victory to which you are entitled."

Tobin said that he remained silent while the steel wage dispute was pending before the government's W.S.B. for a recommended solution. "But he said that after the W.S.B. ruled and the union has accepted its recommendations and the industry has not, I don't feel any obligation to be impartial any more." The Labor Secretary thereupon gave a blanket endorsement of the union's position and maintained that the steel industry could afford to give the workers the W.S.B.'s entire 26-cent hourly wage boost package and still make good profits. The convention's strike threat was made even though the steel industry is under government seizure with workers technically employees of the government and thus legally barred from any walkout. Legality of President Truman's seizure action is being contested, however, before the Supreme Court.
