FORESTERS MEETING.—A meeting was held yesterday to select a place for the meeting of the High Court of the Independent Order of Foresters to be held in June next. The place was not finally decided upon, but the indications are that the meeting will be held in Charlottetown.

BOSTON POTATO MARKET.—Boston advices of the 1st inst. regard the potato market there in a very unsatisfactory condition. Maineatoes and Heltons are selling at 60 cents per bushel.
