

Coal For Power May Mean Boom For Ailing Industry

MONTREAL (CP) — A Canadian coal expert says coal-burning thermal electric stations may provide an attractive market for the ailing coal industry.

In a paper to the world power conference, C. L. O'Brien, assistant to the chairman of the Dominion Coal Board, said a trend is developing which should balance coal losses in railway and household markets.

Mr. O'Brien said there has been a tremendous growth in the demand for fuel energy in Canada, with petroleum meeting the greatest increase in requirements. Across the country, coal had lost out to oil for locomotive use and to both gas and oil for household heating, while it held its own for industrial use.

He described coal-burning electric stations as the most striking economic trend in the coal picture.

energy. The papers, highly diversified in character, dealt with the economics of the solid fuel situation.

Some of them covered primarily the extent and character of fuel resources in the region concerned and others the various fields of specialization.

Generally, the papers viewed the extent of the possible contribution of nuclear fission to the solution of the energy problem as being essentially in the post-experimental stage of development.

COAL FUTURE SOLID

E. A. Allcutt, professor emeritus of mechanical engineering of the University of Toronto, said this implies that fossilized fuels, principally coal and oil, will be the main standby for years to come. As these are not replaceable they will inevitably become scarcer and more expensive.

Professor Allcutt, who prepared a general report on the dozen papers added that the growing tendency to substitute oil and gas for coal in applications such as heating and railway work must necessarily increase their rate of exhaustion and speed up the ultimate transfer of demand back to solid fuels.

"It is imperative that the reserves of solid fuel be conserved, as far as possible, by appropriate use and elimination of waste," he said.

"In the past these principles have been honored more in the breach than in the observance. High grade fuels have been used where the cheaper and more abundant low grade fuels would suffice. Inefficient combustion processes have been employed and valuable by-products have been thrown away."

GAS TO RETREAT?

Mr. O'Brien said ultimately the competition for coal from natural gas will be restricted mainly to the more remunerative household and institutional outlets since the cost of transportation from Alberta will be a major factor.

"In the development stage, however, which will extend over the next few years it may be anticipated that gas will be offered at very low prices for industrial use in order to provide volume for the pipeline.

"There will probably develop a trend away from coal while this condition persists, but the extent of the change is unpredictable."

Describes Russia Country Of Construction Workers

MONTREAL (CP)—Russia has been known as "a country of construction workers" since the Second World War — and for good reason, says the chief engineer of Russia's giant Kuibyshev dam.

Ivan V. Komzin, member of the Soviet delegation attending the world power conference here, said in an interview it is difficult to find a spot in the Soviet Union where something is not being built.

"We are raising power stations, plants and houses—mainly because during the war many of our buildings were devastated," he said.

Recently, to raise Russia's living standard, a huge program was begun to build chemical plants for textiles, artificial leather and other consumer goods.

The immense Kuibyshev dam produces 15 per cent of European Russia's electricity, said its boss, a powerfully built man with a firm handshake.

FED TO MOSCOW

Grounded Power Line, Not Meteor Probe Indicates

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — An arm gave way on a power line tower in Virginia Thursday night, touching off a reaction that mistakenly led to the belief that a meteor had smashed the 58-foot tower.

Kentucky Utilities Company said a giant cake of red-hot siltate, formed when the fallen 33,000-volt line made contact with sandstone, actually was the object first identified as a meteor weighing between 1,000 and 2,000 pounds.

The damaged tower at Imboden, Va., belonged to Old Dominion Power Company, a subsidiary of KU.

Deepsea Salvage Business Is Gamble With Seas, Weather

HALIFAX (CP) — Stakes run into the millions when Foundation Maritime Limited sends its tugs into a salvage gamble against hostile seas and whimsical weather.

But Foundation's marine division, the only deep-sea salvage company on Canada's East Coast, seldom loses a battle with the elements in saving a foundering ship. Now in its 30th year, Foundation has saved about 500 ships from Atlantic graves. They total about 2,800,000 tons.

The Foundation Company of Canada subsidiary enters a "no cure—no pay" agreement when it answers a ship's distress signal, and the normal contract calls for safe delivery of the ship to port. Failure means no payment.

"It's all a gamble," admits President and General Manager A. G. Sullivan.

JULY SAW BIG RISK

Foundation's biggest risk came in July when the company rescued the grounded 28,500-ton ore-carrier Cosmic. Marine Superintendent Captain Reginald Featherstone, a Royal Navy-trained salvage expert, ordered \$2,225,000 worth of equipment and 100 men into the job, the company's only job so far this year.

The Cosmic, biggest ship ever to ground on Canada's Atlantic seaboard, was stuck and ripped open on a rock shelf near the

Employment Figures For US Are Given

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government reported Tuesday that unemployment in the United States dropped by 600,000 last month, to 4,699,000. The drop was not as big as is usual at this time of year.

The rate of U.S. unemployment — after taking seasonal factors into account — rose to the highest point since the war, excluding one month in 1949 when a coal strike pushed up the figure.

The commerce and labor departments reported American employment in August was up nearly 200,000 to a seasonal high of 65,387,000.

August unemployment compared with a July figure of 5,294,000. The departments calculated that 7.6 per cent of the labor force was jobless last month on a seasonally adjusted basis.

BACK TO 1949

This topped the previous recession high of 7.5 per cent in April and compared with a July rate of 7.3 per cent. The last time the rate reached 7.6 per cent was during the coal strike of October, 1949.

Statisticians said changes in the unemployment rate during the summer "did not signify any major job developments but instead reflected the difficulties in achieving a precise adjustment of the data for seasonality at a time when large numbers of students move into and out of the labor market."

There was no question, however, but that the narrow changes in the rate in the last seven months showed that the jobs situation is slow in recovering from the impact of the recession.

A year ago, 2,600,000 Americans were unemployed—a seasonally-adjusted rate of 4.3 per cent.

No One Can Feel Safe While A-Bomb Material Available

GENEVA (AP)—An American official Tuesday urged an immediate start on developing a world system of controls over materials that can be used to make atomic bombs.

No country can feel safe while potentially dangerous fissionable materials are being distributed throughout the world for use in nuclear power reactors, said Robert M. McKinney, United States representative to the international atomic energy agency.

"We cannot accept delay" in setting up international safeguards, he told a meeting of labor unionists attending the atoms-for-peace conference here.

"The day of the free market in natural uranium is probably not far off. More widespread use of nuclear energy is inevitable.

McKinney also urged the setting up of international rules for health and safety in peaceful uses of atomic energy—rules that would "remove this controversial subject from the arena of national political bias and propaganda."

EMOTIONALLY UPSET

A study group of the United Nations World Health Organization reported meanwhile that most people are afraid and emotionally upset over even peaceful uses of atomic energy.

Explaining the fear, the report said "radiation is invisible, undetectable, untested and unfeared, apparently infinitely powerful, yet springs from an almost infinitely small source."

This anxiety had people around the world suffering varying degrees of emotional or mental illness. Many people "now have a feeling that Pandora's box has been opened, and that anything could happen now."

The best hope for improved mental health in the atomic age lies in training children, at home and school, to live realistically in a world of rapid change, uncertainties and uncertainties, the report recommended.

The 5,000 nuclear scientists attending the atoms conference were locked meanwhile in highly technical discussions on the physics of the "fundamental particles constantly bombarding outer space from their source—the stars."

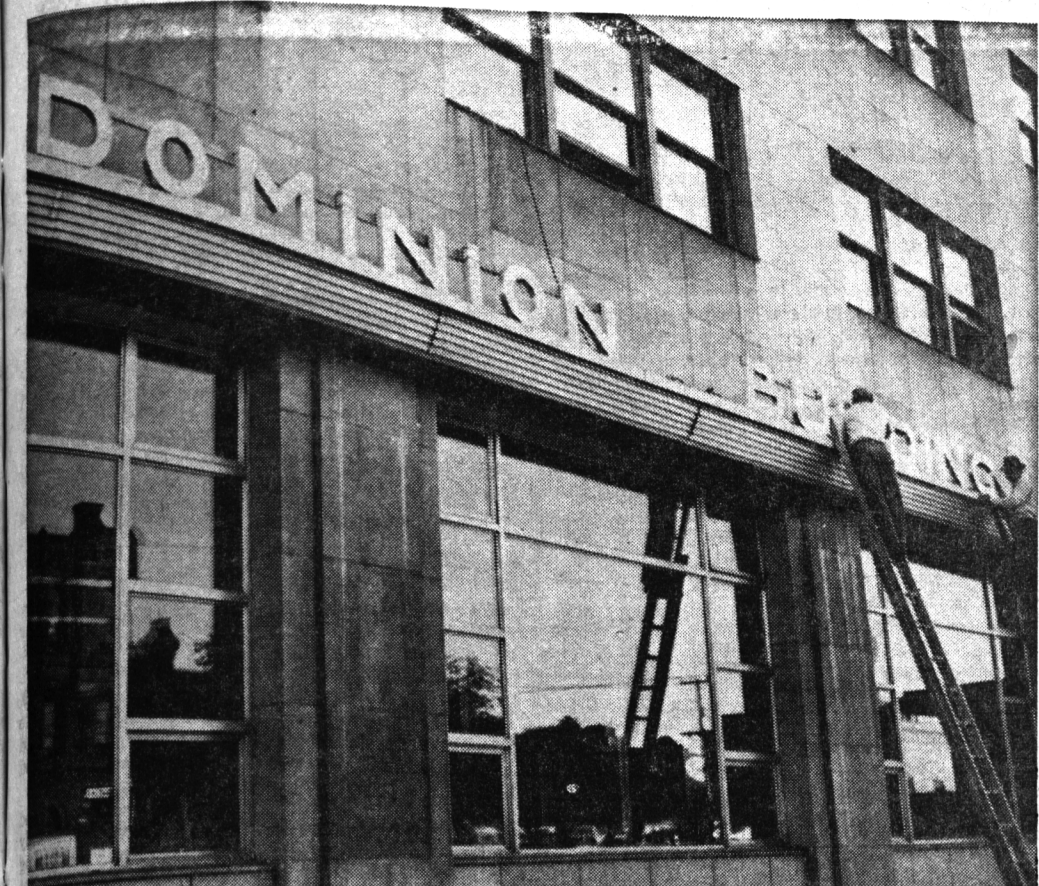

THIS CONTROL SERVICE

The Provincial Mastitis Control Programme was initiated in 1951. The efforts of the Veterinary Division with its Laboratory facilities are combined with those of the dairyman and are directed towards wiping out Mastitis in a herd. The Department bears the laboratory costs. This programme is still in effect today and is felt by both the Dairy Superintendent and the Director of Veterinary Services that more dairymen should take advantage of this service, particularly since Mastitis is probably one of the most costly diseases.

EGG-SHELL MOTTLING

Eggs with mottled shells have become a problem of increasing economic importance in recent years. Some buyers downgrade mottled eggs because they mistakenly believe that mottling indicates thin shells, poor interior quality or a quality that will not hold up well in market channels.

What it is—Shell mottling has been variously described as darkish, bluish, greasy or wretched spots or blotches on the shell, caused by uneven distribution of water in the shell. Mottled areas vary in size from pin-point specks to large patches. So far as is known, no relationship exists between shell mottling and yolk mottling.

Relation to quality—Do mottled eggs have poor interior quality and thin shells? The facts: (1) Eggs with mottled shells have just as good internal and keeping quality as eggs with no mottling. (2) Shell mottling does not indicate porous, thin or defective shells. (3) Shell mottling is not

Williams ran into severe air turbulence and heavy icing on his eastward flight, and turned back to land at Torbay, Nfld., before returning to Idlewild Airport here.

In San Francisco, meanwhile, a Pan American Airways captain, Charles Banfe, said he plans to leave Idlewild this morning in a try for the non-stop Tokyo to San Francisco record in a similar plane. Banfe is flying to New York by commercial plane. He will try to fly his light plane eastward around the world to get to Tokyo.
