JOSEPH JACKSON, a merchant of Montreal, has presented the Presbyterian College of Montreal, with \$4,000, upon which the trustees are to pay him six per cent. per annum for life, and at his death to become absolute owners of the money.

MR. GEORGE HOWATT, of Crapaud has shipped to London, G. B., by the brigantine *Florence*, the largest quantity of potatoes shipped to England from this Province during the present season—7,800 bushels. Mr. Howatt also shipped to the London market, by the brig *Florence*, 2,900 pounds of butter.

WE learn that the "Prince Edward" has been engaged to take a cargo of about 10,000 barrels of potatoes and 200 sheep to England, on her next trip from this Province. She will leave Liverpool to-morrow, and will be due here on or about the 18th inst.

THE Danes of New Denmark held a meeting a few days ago to consider the subject of bringing out more of their countrymen to New Brunswick, the selection of a Dane as an emigration agent to Denmark, and the securing of a tract of Crown Land in advance of the arrival of the emigrants.

THE I. C. Railway safe on a passenger train was broken into on Wednesday, between Londonderry and Westwood, and robbed of \$400. The bag was ripped open on one side; and why any one should have taken out one bag only, and leave two others with double the amount untouched, is a mystery.
