Organize Third Juvenile Lodge

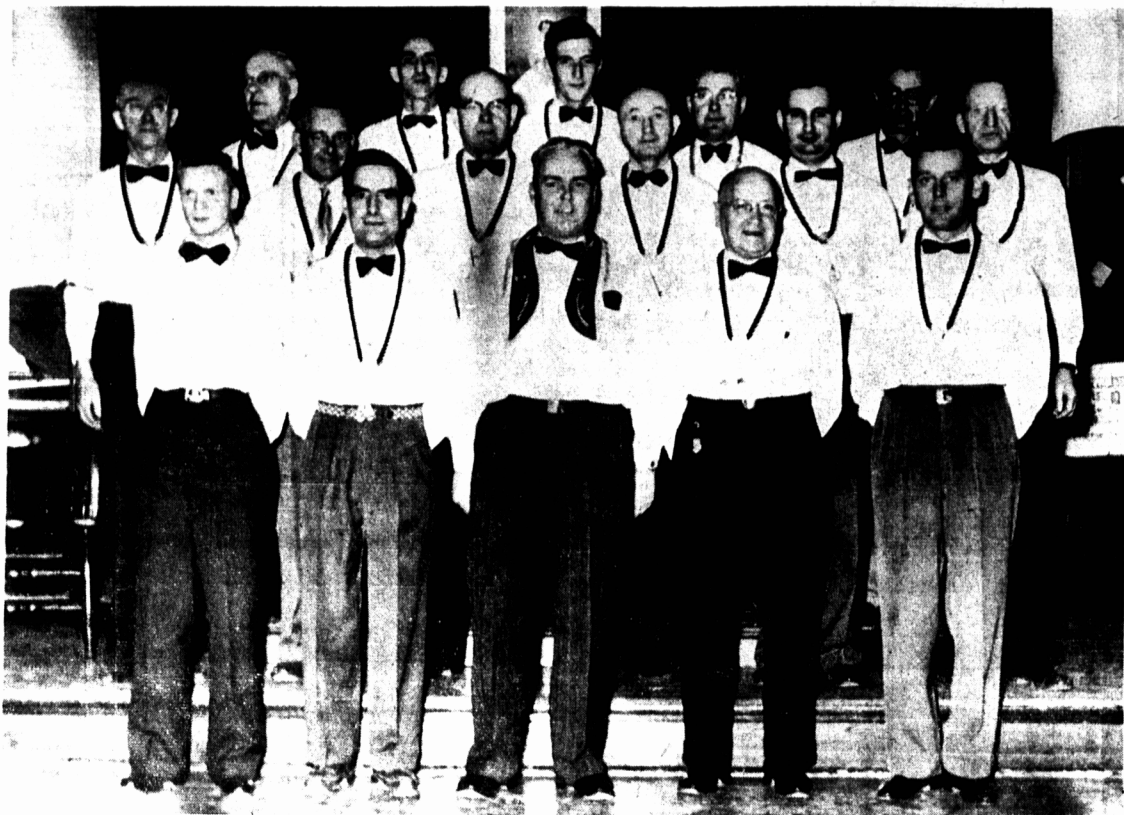

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (CP)—Russia and the West reached virtual agreement Thursday on a compromise resolution launching President Eisenhower's atoms-for-peace plan. Only one point of difference remains but delegates predict this will not prevent unanimous approval of the resolution by the UN.

Record Figure For Can. Banking Capital Funds

MONTREAL, Nov. 22 — Outstanding among the features of the Bank of Montreal's financial report, published today, are a record figure for Canadian banking capital funds and new high levels for deposits and loans. Covering the 12 months to October 31, the statement shows that B of M shareholders' funds, exclusive of undivided profits, now amount to \$131,783,736 — the highest figure for any chartered bank in Canada.

B of M resources total \$2,548,508,239, which is an increase of \$184 million since 1953. They are the highest in the bank's history.

As a result of the recent offering of new B of M stock, the bank's capital, which for many years stood at \$36,000,000, has risen to \$43,927,912, while the rest account now stands at \$37,855,824. Upon completion of the new issue, the figures will reach \$45,000,000 and \$80,000,000 respectively — a total of \$135,000,000 for shareholders' funds, exclusive of undivided profits.

Aside from this important change in capital funds, the outstanding feature of the statement is the large increase in deposits. At \$2,365 million, deposits are 139 million higher than they were a year ago.

Indicative of the bank's high degree of liquidity are the figures for government and other securities which, taken together, now run to \$1,170 million, as compared with \$982 million in 1953. Quick assets now total \$1,694,056,090 — equal to 70.17 per cent of public liabilities.

At \$794 million, "commercial and other loans" show an increase of somewhat more than seven million dollars, while call loans are up from \$70 million in 1953 to \$97 million.

This year's statement shows a new item — "Mortgages and hypothecs insured under the National Housing Act, 1954" amounting to \$10,880,652.

Net earnings are up compared with the 1953 figure. After providing for income tax payments to the extent of \$6,925,000, the bank reported profits of \$7,344,274.



against \$7,042,876 a year ago. Payments to shareholders totalled \$5,436,395, which represents the same rate of return as in the previous year.
