SIR CHARLES ON THE BUDGET

Scores Sir Richard the Reformed

AND SPEAKS OF MR. FIELDING'S FISCAL POLICY.

Others Take Part in the Debate Which Finally Closed.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, May 6.—Sir Charles Tupper continued the Budget debate, beginning with a reference to Cartwright's reply to Foster.

Sir Charles would not break the rules of the House by calling Cartwright a mischievous demagogue, to quote Sir Richard's own words. He would say, however, that Sir Richard was formerly a mischievous demagogue but now he was a reformed man who had given up agitation and was devoting himself to the cultivation of certain family interests in which he had been singularly successful.

Sir Richard had withdrawn from public life. Sir Charles was glad to see Sir Richard transformed from a mischievous demagogue to a good Canadian.

Sir Charles then described the pleasure he felt on hearing Fielding's essay commending three institutions in which he had spent all the prime of his life in attacking, viz, Confederation, National Policy and the Canadian Pacific Railway.

He suggested that Fielding should have made his speech in a more penitential attitude.

As Minister of Finance he was borrowing money at 3½ per cent. He congratulated him on his failure to reduce the savings bank interest to 2½, as he wanted to do last year.

If he had carried out that purpose a large amount of money would have been withdrawn, and the Government would have been obliged to borrow extensively.

Concluding Sir Charles pointed out that the United States was driving all other countries out of the iron industry and that Canada had a natural position and resources to share in the development if proper encouragement were given.

Sir Charles was of the opinion that this country would not only take a high position as an iron producing country but he agreed with the views recently expressed by Bertram, the member for Toronto, that Canada would become a great centre of industry in the construction of steel ships.

The debate was continued by Patterson, Pope, (Conservative) and Lloyd (Liberal.)

At the close of Lloyd's speech Fielding's motioned that the house go into committee ways and means was dropped as there was no tariff changes to be considered.

This ends the budget debate which occupied only three days the most of the speakers having discussed on the address various topics usually covered in a budget debate.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

FRIDAY, May 5.

House met at 12.30. Mr. Sinclair submitted a bill incorporating the Springton Cemetery Company, which was referred to the private bills committee.

Mr. Shaw presented a petition from certain inhabitants of Montague relative to the extension of a certain road at Montague Bridge.

Hon. Mr. McLean thought the petition was a reasonable one, and that it would be advisable to extend the road a certain distance.

The petition was referred to the Government's action.

Mr. Prowse presented a petition from the Local Council of the Women of Charlottetown, that at least in the case of the School Board of Charlottetown such an amendment to the Education Act be passed as will render women eligible as School Trustees, and in order to make their influence more effective, that one-third of the aforesaid Board be women.

Mr. Campbell took the objection that the petition was not signed by three of the petitioners, as provided by a standing rule of the House, and was therefore irregular.

At the afternoon session of the point raised by Mr. Campbell was discussed at some length, and the Speaker ruled that the petition should be received. This was done, and the petition was referred to the committee having the School Bill in charge.

Mr. Birch asked the Commissioner of Public Works if he had received a petition from the inhabitants of Lots 1 and 2 praying for a new road from the Thompson Road to the shore, and if it is the intention of the Government to open said road.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the petition had been received and was under the consideration of the Government.

Mr. Birch asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to open a new road from the Montrose Road near Robert Bonness' to the Campbell Road, a distance of ¼ of a mile, as requested by a petition from the inhabitants in 1898 and promised by the Commissioner at last session.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the matter would be considered during recess, and if deemed in the public interest the road would be opened.

Hon. Honor Lieutenant-Governor Howland, at this stage, entered the house and to rally assented to the Hilsborough Bridge bill.

Hon. Mr. McLaughlin moved the House into committee on the second reading of the bill incorporating the Mount Stewart Forester Hall Company. The motion carried, and Mr. Forbes took the chair. In committee the bill was reported agreed to and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

On motion of Mr. D. A. McKinnon the House resumed committee on the bill incorporating the Prince Edward Island Mutual Fire Insurance Company, Mr. McWilliam in the chair.

At the evening session the bill was reported agreed to on a straight party vote. Mr. Wise declined to vote. Third reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McLean the House went into committee on the bill authorizing the trustees of the South-East School to borrow money for certain purposes, Mr. Forbes taking the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment, and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Rogers presented a bill amending the Public Schools Act, which was set down for second reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. H. C. McDonald the House went into committee on the bill amending the Act relating to the appointment of Stipendiary Magistrates, by providing that the jail in Summerside shall be the prison for West Prince. Mr. Prowse acted as chairman, and the bill was reported agreed to. Third reading tomorrow.

Mr. M. McKinnon moved the second reading of the bill incorporating the Grand District and Subordinate Lodges of Good Templars. The motion carried and Mr. Birch took the chair of the committee. Reported agreed to. Third reading tomorrow.

House adjourned until 3 p. m. on Monday.

Spring in the Northwest.

WINNIPEG, May 4.—Reports received here indicate that spring through out the country is a fortnight later than last year with an increase of about fifteen per cent. of the wheat acreage sown, and a corresponding increase in oats and barley. Weather has been cold with intermittent rain and snow.

Sues His Father-in-Law.

VIENNA, May 3.—The Volks Zeitung today says that Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria has commenced suit against his father-in-law, the Duke of Parma, for refusing, since the death of Princess Marie, wife of Prince Ferdinand, to pay the annuity fixed in the marriage contract, on the ground that Prince Ferdinand had violated the contract by having Prince Boris, his son, baptized in the Orthodox Church.

Not a Detriment

PARIS, May 5.—At the request of the Russian Government, M. D'Almeida, Minister of Foreign Affairs, communicated to the press an official denial of the statements made in an article in the London Times that the Anglo-Russian agreement was in France's detriment. The Echo of Paris expresses hope that the official arrangement between Russia and Great Britain differs materially from the present interpretation of it, "otherwise," the paper says, "our interests in Abyssinia and the Far East will be held cheaply by the Moscovites."

More Earthquakes.

ATHENS, May 4.—Severe seismic disturbances visited the southern and eastern districts of Peloponnesus (the southern portion of the kingdom of Greece) last night. The town of Ligudiza was seriously damaged, many houses being thrown down.
