Hong Kong Ceremonies Planned

FREDERICTON (CP)—Three Canadian army veterans, now stationed at nearby Gasetown, have left for Hong Kong to take part in ceremonies commemorating the fall of the British colony to the Japanese 25 years ago Christmas Day. Ordnance Corps Pte. Murray B. Brown, sapper Bernard P. Duplessis of the Royal Canadian Engineers, both 44, and 45-year-old Sgt. Raymond W. Elliott of the 3rd Brigade Service Battalion, were among Canadians taken prisoner in 1941 when Hong Kong fell. At that time they were members of the Royal Rifles of Canada. They will be among 21 Canadian servicemen who will participate in ceremonies at Hong Kong, Pusan in Korea and Yokohama, from Dec. 2-15. Their trips are being sponsored by the Hong Kong Association of Canada and the department of veterans affairs. An estimated 30 per cent additional are in the process of bridging that gap, but the remainder probably won't make it. NO CHANGE IN CELIBACY FOR PRIESTS

ROME (AP)—An influential Jesuit publication said here it sees no prospect of the Roman Catholic Church changing its celibacy rule for priests. At the same time, it said seminarians should be made aware of what lifelong chastity means and perhaps should undergo a "test period" before priesthood. Civiltà Cattolica, published in Rome by the largest Roman Catholic religious society, rejected the opinion that the Vatican would give in to mounting pressure and make celibacy no longer required for a priest. "We do not believe in the least that the struggle for celibacy has been lost," Civiltà Cattolica said. "On the contrary, we have strong reasons to believe that despite all the pressures and the press campaigns, the church will hold fast on this point."

Island Cattlemen Make Top Purchases

By NEIL A. MATHESON I bumped into some news a few days ago about purchases by island cattlemen at the time of the Royal Winter Fair, though not all of the animals were purchased at the fair itself. Stanley Hurry, Winsloe, brought back a two-year old bull that was first at the Canadian National Exhibition this year, and second in his class at the Royal. He bought a three-year old heifer that was first at both of the big fairs this year, also a good two-year old heifer. They came from the Blue Rock herd of Fred Fry, Campbellton, Ontario. Dan Jewell, East Wiltshire, brought back a young bull that is a full brother of the Hurry purchase. These two island men showed some Dual Purpose Short-horn cattle at the Royal, and Hurry was in the money twice with three animals, and Dan was in the money twice with five entries. Fulton Sanderson and Sons, York Point purchased some good Hereford cattle from Wagner Brothers of Weyburn, Saskatchewan. A yearling bull topped his class, a heifer stood fifth in her class of 25 animals, and they took home a calf out of the first prize senior cow. This cow weighs 1,850 pounds, Fulton told me. The bull at 17 months, weighs 1,575 pounds and the two year old heifer weighs in at 1,380. Otto Newson, Cornwall bought a polled Scotch Shorthorn bull that was a year old in September and a heifer calf that was born in February. He bought the animals from a Quebec herd. Gerald Dollar and Son, Winsloe bought a 16-month old bull from Strathroy Miller, Peterboro, Ontario. He's a reddish cross animal and topped his class of 18 bulls at the Peterboro fair. This bull also is a poll. Mr. Newson told me that his bull is expected to throw a head 50 per cent poll calves, so it'll be interesting to see how close he lives up to that goal. BRIDGE GAP I was interested in a statement made Saturday by Dr. Glen C. Russell, director of the Experimental Farm, who said figures indicate some 10 to 30 per cent of the farmers have succeeded in bridging the gap from the old way of doing things to the new. An estimated 30 per cent additional are in the process of bridging that gap, but the remainder probably won't make it. This is only an estimate, of course, but it indicates that the farmers of the future will be much fewer than is the case today. good argument against the people who suggest it's impossible to make a living off the herd is much bigger than that, or is Mr. White an exception? Incidentally the highest BCAs recorded among class leaders in this province was the 195 milk and 123 butterfat by a cow from the herd of Almon Wood and Son. The son is Wallace Wood, and he's the man, I believe, who is largely responsible for the milking herd. I've been told by several knowledgeable cattlemen here that "Wallie Wood will have the best Ayrshire herd in the province in 10 years time." Predictions don't always live up to expectations. But I know that the Wood herd will be a really good one. That's for sure.

Incidentally this man Glen Cotton gets more praise from people to whom I talk, than any of the others. The call for a beef field man was insistent for a long time; naming Glen Cotton to that post must have been the most popular thing Andrew MacRae ever did, when he was minister. Everywhere I go, I keep hearing good things about Glen. Knowing him as I do, I'm not surprised. HIGH AVERAGE Getting back to that Ayrshire meeting I want to congratulate W. A. Moise and son, Wendell, Kensington R. B. for having the herd that topped the province in herd averages. The measure is herd class averages in the province. Their herd-rated BCAs of 145 in milk, 141 in butterfat. The reference here is to a comparison of Ayrshire milk cows across Canada. The national average would be 100 percent; every point above 100 is that much to the good. The Moise herd has won this "best in the province" award every year since the provincial averages have been compiled. Last Wednesday I was talking with Robert White Miller B.A.F. and was interested to find Saturday that his cow, Sunny Bay Sally Ann had the highest BCA in the province for cows over 10 years of age. This man has seven milking cows, a small herd, so his performance is that much more outstanding. His father, William A. White bought the foundation cow 44 years ago from Tupper Ferguson, Little York. He lived where Almon Wood lives now. BIG PRICE Mr. White paid \$134 for the animal, and that was considered "a really big price" at the time. "Father had to sell three of his best grade cows to buy her," recalls the son who says "my father is the man who really deserves the credit for building the herd." This man farms only 145 acres of land, he raises all the hay for his herd - he has some 18 animals in all - that's counting the young cattle - and buys most of his grain as 16 percent dairy ration. And he's making a living at that, which seems to be a fairly

Threat Is Seen To New Car Sales

NEW YORK (AP) — Uncertainty over the 1967 U.S. economic outlook may slow the pace of new car sales next year. Henry Ford II said here. But he added the long-range picture remains bright and the market is a long way off. In remarks prepared for a bankers conference the head of the Ford Motor Co. said: "If new car sales continue at a rate of about \$500,000 a year as they have since late October total sales for 1966 will come in at just below \$2,000,000—down from last year's record \$2,000,000 but well ahead of all other years. "The potential seems to be there for new car sales of \$900,000 or more despite the steep rise in the price of services, food and other non-durable goods." Continued public uncertainty will probably keep car sales from rising Ford said "even if the economy continues to gain in 1967."

Ontario Due For Election

BROCKVILLE, Ont. (CP) — Premier John Robarts says there will be a provincial election next year. He did not mention a date. "Irrespective of centennial celebrations, there will be an election next year," he told a news conference prior to the opening of the Eastern Ontario Progressive Conservative Association. "It is time members of the various organizations started preparing for the next election." Party sources said they believe Mr. Robarts plans to call the election in June. The last general election, was Sept. 20, 1963 and the Ontario legislature has a maximum life of five years. Party standings in the 100-seat legislature are Progressive Conservative 78, Liberals 23 and the New Democratic party eight. The Conservatives have held power since 1963.
