I watched Jimmy being trained by his father before leaving for Newark, N.J. he was applied his famous "sleeper" hold, a natural ability to become a great fighter, Aubrey Pound, "its a great thrill to know Jimmy McGinnis is returning to Island rings. I watched Jimmy box several times on my trips to Tignish with other folks in the village and the ability he had at that time was evident that he had a future in boxing....see you at ringside.

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Bauer, New York Yankee outfielder, was arrested Tuesday on a charge of felonious assault on a complaint of a delicatessen store operator who charged he was beaten by Bauer in the Copacabana night club early last Thursday.

Bauer was booked shortly before noon under his full name, Henry A. Bauer.

Cleveland Indians Defeat Red Sox; NY Giants Lose

BOSTON (AP)—Cleveland Indians turned a four-error inning and Chico Carrasquel's grand slam-home run into an 8-2 victory over collapsing Boston Red Sox Tuesday behind the seven-hit pitching of Early Wynn.

The veteran Wynn, who drove in the Tribe's first two runs, was locked in a 1-1 duel with young Dave Sisler when the Red Sox defence crumbled in the sixth inning.

Shortstop Billy Klaus, demoted from second to seventh in the batting order for the game because of his plummeting .181 average, was the tragic figure in the Red Sox defeat—his seventh in the last 10. He committed three bobbles in the sixth.

In the bottom of the sixth, Klaus was injured and left the game.

CHICAGO (AP)—Two infield errors, plus singles by Jack Littrell and Cal Neenan after two were out in the ninth gave Chicago Cubs a 4-3 victory over New York Giants Tuesday.

The Cubs' first Wrigley Field triumph in nine starts this season came after Stu Miller apparently had a two-hit victory in the bag on Willie Mays' theft of home in the sixth and Willie's No. 5 homer in the eighth for a 3-2 Giant lead.

With one out in the ninth, Miller issued his third walk. Wall Moryn grounded to Red Schoendienst for an apparent game-ending double play.

Shortstop Daryl Spencer threw wild on the relay to first. Moryn reached second. Jim Bolger was safe on Foster Castleman's bobbles at third. Littrell slammed his second hit of the game, a single to centre, scoring Moryn to make it 3-3.

Sandy Consuegra replaced Miller, but Neenan popped to short centre and the ball dotted between Schoendienst and Mays for a single which scored Bolger with the winning run.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Philadelphia Phillies and Milwaukee Braves were tied 1-1 Tuesday night when their game was called after 5½ innings because of rain. The contest will be replayed from the start.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Homers by Pee Wee Reese Tuesday and Sandy Amoros and the eight-hit pitching of Johnny Podres Tuesday night helped Brooklyn Dodgers tighten the National

League scramble with a 6-1 win over the league-leading Cincinnati Reds.

Podres didn't walk a batter going the distance for Brooklyn.

The Dodgers belted a dozen hits off three Redleg pitchers running a win streak to five games. It hoisted Brooklyn to a second place tie with Milwaukee's Braves.

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Pierce pitched a four-hitter and drove in one of Chicago's three runs in the sixth inning Tuesday night as the league leading White Sox gained their first victory of the season over New York Yankees, 3-1.

The flashy left-handed pitcher led a crowd of 28,059 to a dazzling exhibition as he struck out seven of the defending world champions and walked but one, that intentionally, to record his sixth triumph against two defeats.

Pierce, mixing a puzzling curve and a masterfully controlled change-up with his fast ball, retired the last 16 batters he faced. The loudest Yankee hit was Elston Howard's second inning double.

The triumph, Chicago's first in four meetings with New York this year, increased the White Sox lead to three games over the Yankees, who dropped to third place, one game behind Cleveland. The Indians defeated Boston 8-2 in the afternoon.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ryne Duren, Kansas City right-hander, had a perfect game going against Washington Tuesday night but Lou Berberet's leadoff homer in the sixth inning wrecked it and the Washington Senators won the contest 7-0 against the Athletics.

Duren, who yielded five hits before being chased in the seventh inning, allowed another run in the seventh when Jim Lemon walked and came around on singles by Berberet and pinchhitter Julio Becquer.

Fight News Galore

Sir: The Sport pages of 1912 reveal fight news galore. Bill McKinnon, whom the local fight fans have never forgotten, was fighting in Boston. Up there, the memorable Bill battled Porky Flynn of Boston to a draw, they were fierce rounds said a dispatch the whole 10 of them, McKinnon excelled it said at infighting and was the aggressor, but his opponent, 20 pounds heavier proved to be a tough customer and by clever footwork and ability to clinch, which were ticketed for the knockout route, it was a fight that kept the fans on edge.

Louis Kid Laffery, another well remembered ring figure in Charlottetown, battled to a 15 round draw with Jack O'Hara of Tignish at the old Y on Prince St. the bout was billed for the Island Welterweight Title, Jim Smart refereed the bout in his usual capable manner, it was announced before the fight that Jack Grant of Peakes challenged the winner. In April of the same year Big Jim Pendergast of Kensington pounded out a six round decision over Jim Smart. Pendergast had as his second a Mr. McDonald, while Smart was handled by Kid Laffery and Barney McCluskey.

The boxing bouts at the Old Arena on Fitzroy early in May 1912 attracted several hundred men. The opening bout featured a cleaver 3 round boxing exhibition between Hudson McLeod and Barney McCluskey, the first two rounds were fairly even, the last round was lively but no great damage was done. McCluskey proved the superior and was awarded the decision on points.

The main event between Tom McCluskey and Bob Stanley was according to the script, the clang of the bell had hardly gone out of the air when Stanley started in at a terrific pace and a fierce onslaught on his opponent on whom he landed two or three blows, McCluskey however landed so heavily and frequently in return and inflicted such punishment that the referee Sergeant Hawkins stopped the bout within half a minute of the end of round one. It was certainly a winning night for the McCluskey brothers. There was a strong desire among the Charlottetown fight fans at the time, to see one Man McCluskey and Big Jim Pendergast meet in the squared circle.

Local fight followers will get an opportunity to watch Tignish's sensational young scrapper Jimmy McGinnis here May 24th, when he will headline Ivan Doherty's show, against Johnny Roberts, the elusive New York Lightweight. Young McGinnis has been against a great variety of fighters, all of them formidable in his young professional ring career, he will meet someone different again in the extremely formidable person of Roberts. The latter is so highly rated in New York that fight critics predict that he will defeat McGinnis with ease. However, the P.E.I. native has other ideas about the outcome of the fight, he has a reputation of forcing the fight, he had to do it to save a bout on more than one occasion its crowd pleasing but at the same time its mighty dangerous when leading a foe of the ring powers of Roberts. Both fighters are expected to arrive in the city Wed. or Thur. at the latest, they will hold a light workout at the Sports Arena that will terminate heavy training for this scrap. They will enter the ring about the same weight 138 lbs. Roberts the taller of the two will have a slight advantage in reach. They will weigh in before commissioner Dr. Kilorn on Friday afternoon.
