MONDAY

The three incorporated villages are O'Leary, Crapaud and Parkdale. One Commissioner is to be elected in each of the latter two, and three for O'Leary.

The date for payment of taxes in order to qualify for voting is set on February 2nd. It is expected that contests will be held in each locality, and keen interest is already in evidence.

THURSDAY

The home of Mr. Elmer R. Griffin, Brockton, near Elmsdale, was completely destroyed by fire about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Despite the efforts of neighbours very little was saved. Origin of the fire was not known. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Summerside's new post office will be open for business on Monday, January 28th. It has been learned. The move from the old quarters will be made over the weekend and it is expected that all will be in readiness for Monday.

On Saturday evening at 7:00 p.m. the new post office box job will be open and citizens wishing to obtain the new keys may do so at that time.

Summerside coal dealers yesterday reported that the problem created by the scarcity of coal has improved slightly, although the supply is still unsatisfactory, and remains a car-to-car proposition.

The dealers have been unable to build up even a small stockpile of coal to continue to be unloaded to a waiting list of customers as soon as the cars arrive, and one dealer reported that while they were rationing out coal in small quantities locally, requests had been made to them from many districts where the need for coal was urgent at points as far west as Alberton.

Two dealers reported that they were each getting an average of almost one car per day, that cars were on order, and more on the way to the Island. They said they had hopes that the situation would soon be improved to a point where they would be able to fill all the orders they have on hand or would receive.

A credit to the parish, to the city and to the Province as a whole, was the way various speakers described the new Holy Redeemer Community Centre which was officially opened last night by His Excellency Rt. Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown. The new Stewart Street building was packed with a solid mass of humanity come to view it for the first time. They saw a structure designed to present every conceivable convenience for the creation of a full parish life. The main hall, with its beautiful panel finished walls and hardwood floors is arranged for basketball and badminton as well as other sports, or for use as a meeting hall or theatre. It was noticeable that the acoustics were almost perfect and every word spoken from the stage could be heard in all parts of the

big hall. The building also has many smaller rooms for use by study groups or for committee meetings and in addition has a large downstairs room for social functions as well as a bowling alley with four alleys. Pride of the women of the parish is the ultra modern kitchen offering every convenience for the preparation of lunches or full course meals. A fully insulated projection room will permit the showing of the films which are planned for frequent occasions.

Frederick Doucette is the only Prince Edward Island student to receive his wings in a class of R. C. A. F. and R. A. F. graduates at a wings parade at No. 3 Air Navigation School at Summerside, at 10:30 this morning.

Frederick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph H. Doucette of Ebsfleet, P. E. I., enlisted in the R. C. A. F. on December 26th, 1949, and served as an aero engine technician until March 26th, 1951 when he re-mustered to aircrew, and came to the Summerside station to take the air navigators course.

He will receive his wings this morning from Group Captain A. G. Kenyon C. D., O. B. E., commanding officer, R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside.

Mr. T. J. Kickham, M.P., and Mr. R. J. MacKinnon, representative of the district architect, D. P. W., met with a group of citizens of Montague at the Town Hall yesterday to discuss possible sites for the location of the proposed new post office to be erected in Montague.

Mr. MacKinnon stated that several sites had been surveyed throughout the town, the primary requirements for the site being high level land, centrally located as far as possible, and having several outlets, particularly an area in the rear of the building for the rural couriers. He said that to build up the land where the present post office is located, build retaining walls, buy more land, and remove the present post office would be too high a cost, so that a new location should be considered. The present plans, subject to change, call for a building fifty feet wide and eighty feet long.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell in Supreme Court yesterday rejected a sentence of 10 years in penitentiary to Edward Francis McDonald (Fall) who was convicted last week on a charge of rape. For the same offence he sentenced Elmer Wilfred Feehan, 19, Point de Roche, to serve four years.

A plea for mercy for McDonald was made by his attorney, Mr. Allison Gillis, who said his client had never had a chance, having been sent to reform school when he was 10. He pleaded for a light sentence. Mr. J. A. MacDonald, K. C., counsel for Feehan also asked for leniency. The Chief Justice, in imposing the lighter sentence on him he had taken into consideration the recommendation of the jury for mercy.

Convicted on a charge of driving to the public danger Robert Rackham, Wheatley River, was fined \$200 and his driving license was cancelled for a year. In lieu of payment of the fine he is to serve three months in jail.

Hensin Gray, Hazelbrook, convicted of possession of an offensive weapon was sentenced to serve one month in jail and pay a fine of \$300 or an additional five months. He also had to enter into a recognizance of \$500 to keep the peace for two years.

A coroner's jury in Summerside last evening heard final evidence in the adjourned inquest in the death of Ora Barrie Samuels, of North Tryon, and after deliberating for about 20 minutes brought in the following verdict: "We, your jury empanelled to inquire into the death of Ora Barrie Samuels of North Tryon, find that the deceased came to his death at the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, P. E. I., on December 23rd, 1951, about 10 P.M., of acute ethylene-glycol poisoning.

"According to the evidence submitted, we believe the poison was

unknowingly self-administered. We strongly recommend that manufacturers of these fluids be obliged to have their containers clearly marked poison". The members of the coroner's jury were: Eric W.
