A FINAL REMINDER.

To-morrow the committee rooms of both sides of politics will close in Charlottetown, and those who have neglected the simple matter of registration will be excluded from the preliminary lists of voters.

THE EDUCATION QUESTION.

The Canadian Educational Monthly, to land this morning, contains several paragraphs which bear more or less directly upon the educational question that has been raised in this Province.

Commenting upon the discussion of the matter by the Canadian Medical Association, the Educational Monthly says:

"We are pleased that the doctors gave some of their valuable time to discussing the effect which our educational system has on the boys and girls attending our schools. One member of the Association, Dr. Bayard, of St. John's, took the ground that the present school system put too many studies on young children, and as a result overstrained the nervous system and caused great injury, from which they never recovered."

THE F. E. I. BAPTIST CONFERENCE.

Very interesting sessions of the F. E. I. Baptist Conference were held at Bonaventure on Monday and Tuesday. All but two of the Baptist pastors of the Island were present, together with laymen Simyson, of Cavendish, Layton, of Alexandria, Nichols, of Annandale, France, of Kingston, and a large representation of Bonshaw and vicinity.

The business of Tuesday was largely concerned with the consideration of proposals from the Maritime Convention respecting the conduct of home missions. The conference was not in favor of taking the responsibility of administering home missions on the Island. Its refusal to do so was but a declaration of confidence in the present administration.

A NEW ST. PAUL'S.

The new church to be erected by the congregation will be an ornament to the city. It will be situated at the north of the old church, in a position to admit of ample area spaces for ornamental trees on every side. The material for its walls will be two varieties of Nova Scotia stone—reddish brown for the most part and olive-colored Wallace stone for the facings.

THE CHINESE-JAPANESE WAR.

A Big War Debt—England's Interest and Duty.

Sir Edward Gray, Parliamentary Secretary to the Foreign Office, addressed a meeting at Woolley, Northumberland, a day or two ago. He said: "The longer the struggle between China and Japan is protracted the more difficult it will be to the Government of this country. The Government is to protect the lives and property of British subjects in the far east, and it is also the Government's intention to maintain concert with the other powers in the east. All influences which would arise from any attempt to take political advantage of the situation to the injury of the other powers." Referring to the recent war scare, Sir Edward Gray remarked: "Last week it was stated in the newspapers here that there was a serious risk of our being drawn into a war with France. I am obliged to say that there was absolutely no foundation for the alarming report."

ROME, Oct. 10.—It is announced that Emile Zola, the French author, one of whose latest works, "Lourdes," has been placed on the Index Librorum Prohibitorum by the Vatican authorities, will arrive in this city on October 28. The object of M. Zola's visit is said to be to obtain an audience of the Pope; but the Vatican officials declare, he will not succeed.

MONTREAL, Oct. 10.—British imports from Canada show an increase of 3 per cent. for the month of September, according to the returns published by the British Board of Trade, as compared with September last year. There is also an increase of 7 per cent. in the imports for the nine months of the year, as compared with the same period of last year. Chinese increased £120,000. The exports from Great Britain to Canada decreased 25 per cent. in September, and for the nine months 30 per cent., as against the returns of last year.

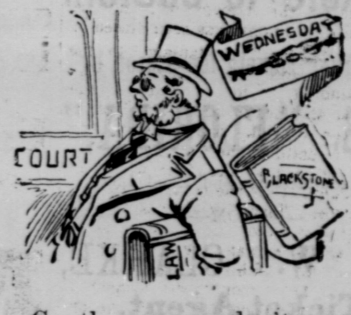
