Famous Personality To Direct Variety

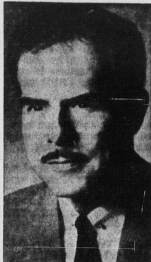
Composer - Arranger - Conductor, Howard Cable is musical director for Canada's first Royal Variety Performance, to be held at 8.30 p.m. Oct. 6, at Confederation Centre Theatre in Charlottetown.

Mr. Cable is conductor of the CNE Grandstand show, where he has written and conducted for such personalities as Victor Borge, Roy Rogers, Ed Sullivan, Danny Kaye, Phil Silvers, Jon Vickers, Teresa Stratas and Robert Goulet.

Graduating from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto at 18 with a degree in conducting and bandmanship, he led his own dance band until 1941, when the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation engaged him as a composer of back band scores for radio dramatic shows.

In 1942 Howard Cable replaced Percy Faith, the now universally celebrated arranger-conductor, on the CBC Network. During the next 12 years, he made headlines with such programs as "Calvacade", "Parade of Song", "The Esso Show" and "Mr. Cable", "Voice of the Army" and "Mr. Showbusiness".

International fame came in the early 50's with a concert se-

ries on Canadian radio heard throughout the United States; next his debut on television and "Showtime"; and the start of his long-term engagement with the Canadian National Exhibition and their annual outdoor presentation "Candiana".

Howard Cable has many other accomplishments including "Motograms", arranger for the Boston "Pops" Orchestra, appearance as guest conductor

Seven Witnesses Testify As Negligence Trial Opens

GEORGETOWN — The evidence of seven crown witnesses was heard at the preliminary hearing of Percy Daniel Dundy of Souris, before Kings County Supt. Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., at Georgetown Tuesday night.

Three Injured In Car Crash

SOURIS — Three persons suffered minor injuries and the vehicle in which they were driving was extensively damaged when the car, a 1962 Pontiac, left the St. Peters Highway, Souris West yesterday.

The car, driven by Walter Avon Ching of Kingsboro, was proceeding west on the highway and had just crossed the Souris West Bridge when it failed to make the turn, knocked off four guard rails, plowed into the ditch and landed against a bridge across the ditch.

The driver, and two passengers, Allan Stewart, Souris, and Douglas Coffin, Fortune, were taken to Souris Hospital and later released.

Souris detachment of the RCMP are investigating the accident.

The hearing was adjourned to Oct. 8 at 7.30 p.m., when it is expected that the crown will put another seven witnesses on the stand.

Dundy, who is represented by Melvin J. McQuaid, Q.C., is charged that on June 7, 1964 at Souris Line Road, he did unlawfully cause the death of General Anthony Longphee, by criminally and recklessly driving a motor vehicle while his ability to drive a motor vehicle was impaired by alcohol and not having the said vehicle under proper control, contrary to Section 192 of the Criminal Code.

The crown is being represented by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, Q.C. Dr. Edward Kassner of Souris, the first witness, told of being called to the scene of the accident about 10.30 p.m., on June 7. He found that Longphee was unconscious and was breathing regularly and slowly. He had him removed to Souris Hospital and later ordered him to Charlottetown Hospital.

His opinion as to why Longphee was unconscious was that he was suffering from a brain hemorrhage. He also examined Dundy and put six stitches in his head. He was in shock.

Longphee died in the Charlottetown Hospital on June 16th. RCMP Constable, James A. Cox gave evidence concerning five photographs of the accident scene, which were submitted in evidence.

Water Works Ass'n More Interested in Students

Work of the parent American Water Works Association was outlined by the past president of the association to delegates attending the annual banquet of the 17th annual meeting of the Maritime Branch of the Canadian Section, Tuesday evening at the Charlottetown Hotel.

W.D. Hurst, of Winnipeg, told delegates that things were "happening" in the American Water Works Association. Present membership was over 18,000, and a total of 4,000 members had attended an association meeting in Toronto this year.

Mr. Hurst was getting more interested in the student and was going to try to encourage student interest in the field.

Chairman of the Canadian Section, AWWA, W. Whelan, of Hamilton, Ont. spoke briefly, and brought greetings from the U.S. defence department.

Delegates tendered Mr. Kline a hearty vote of thanks, for his work.

First Day's Clinics Eleven Short Of Quota

Charlottetown's first day of Red Cross blood donor clinics resulted in a total registration of 364 on an overall objective of 375 — 11 short of the quota.

At St. Dunstan's University where Stephen Joyce, of the junior class headed a very well organized clinic, 175 donors registered on an objective of 225 for the three hour clinic. Winners of the inter-class competition were announced as the Juniors with a 55 per cent result. The Freshmen and Sophomores were in the special "Centennial Year" competition with the 3rd and 4th year students

at PWC achieved a 44 per cent response which was 1 per cent lower than that attained at the April clinics.

A quick glance at the enrollment for the various competitions revealed that the Charlottetown Lions Club were leading, with an attendance of 17 of the 30 members of this group. Lions of both the Charlottetown and Parkdale clubs, with caps and vests, made quite an impressive sight as they paraded into the clinic in a body.

Volunteers who assisted with the many tasks in connection with yesterday's clinics included the students — both girls and boys at SDU, the Women's Auxiliary of Zion Church, the Charlottetown Business and Professional Women's Club, and high school Red Cross members from Queen Charlotte Hill.

Fremont Archer, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee of the city, said last night that while he was gratified with the first day's response, he hoped that today's and tomorrow's objectives would be exceeded in order to make up for some of the province's present deficit of 800 which was accumulated during the past summer when several centres failed to reach the quotas set.

Today's clinics at Zion Church hall are from 9-11 this morning and from 5-7 this evening with an objective of at least 420 donors for the day.
