MONTREAL (CP) — The U.S. dollar Monday closed at a discount of 3 1/2 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, down 1-3/2. Pound sterling \$2.73 1-16, down 1-16.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) — The stock market rambled about Monday amid the slowest trading in nearly a month. At the close no definite trend could be detected. Western oils showed the biggest change on index, off a half point after holding a slight gain in earlier activity. Golds and base metals had smaller losses on index. Golds, which featured early trading, lost their upper edge to close mixed to lower as profit-taking reduced many of the gains recorded in last week's strong rise.

Among other mining groups, coppers firmed while uranium, senior base metals and juniors moved slightly lower. Most price changes were small with losses holding a slight numerical edge. Western oils, featured by Baley-Selburn's 20-cent rise to \$7.65, edged lower. Consolidated West Pele lost 15 cents at \$7.25 but other changes were small with losses outnumbering gains.

Index changes: Golds off .18 to \$2.14; base metals off .10 to 147.13; western oils off .50 to 127.49.

TIMELY NOTES ON FUR TOPICS

Despite the contrary feeling, which is so prevalent in so many directions in the United States, New York Federal Reserve District reports a climb in February's fur sales of 30 per cent over last year. Some of this is believed due to the tremendous sale put on by New York's leading store — Gimbel's.

However, five other districts in the United States show increases of from 24 to 26 percent in sales, while some other districts such as Philadelphia and San Francisco show dips of as big as 32 per cent.

New York has released information on their recent fur sales, which states that a collection of 75,318 dressed miscellaneous mink pelts sold last week at a 92 per cent rate.

That was only a part of the sale which ran for seven days, and the entire EMBA collection of 323,345 mink skins was 80 per cent sold. Another auction company spokesman paid a nice tribute to the H.B.C. when he termed the overall sale results as "fabulous." Demand for miscellaneous goods was strong and the trimming and split-skin interest

helped materially to keep the sale moving.

Discussing the fur market and its prospects, Angela Cuccio, gives a fall forecast in the late issue of "Women's Wear Daily." She believes that the market will continue strong and that mink will still lead the trimmings field, and that long haired furs show signs of moving into the spotlight.

Natural blue and white foxes are reported in demand, and a gain comes mention of a touch of silver fox, and even more of a touch of cross-fox.

At Seattle, Washington, sale on April 10, ranch mink was 82 per cent sold; fine males brought \$25 to \$37 and females \$14 to \$20; ordinary males brought \$16 to \$25.

GOOD DEMAND
At the Helsinki fur sales held in Stockholm, Sweden, on April 20, there was good demand for mink of all types, with the majority of the offerings sold to the United States. Pastel minks, firsts and seconds, were 84 per cent sold, averaging 110 shillings slightly over \$15.00. Topaz male firsts and seconds, were 93 per cent sold, averaging 140 shillings, or about \$19.50. Palomino males, first and seconds, were 77 per cent sold, averaging 118 shillings, or about \$16. Standard males, firsts and seconds, were 83 per cent sold at an average of 113 shillings, and Silverblue males, firsts and seconds, were 64 per cent sold, averaging 130 shillings. Sapphire males, firsts and seconds, were 82 per cent sold and averaged 127 shillings.

The total number of skins sold was 27,000.

TAX PENALTIES
The United States Government has very severe penalties for those who try to dodge paying taxes. The head of one of the big fur corporations in New York was sentenced by a federal court to a 30-day jail sentence and a fine of \$1,000 for disobeying an internal revenue service subpoena directing him to produce books and records of his corporation.

In the latest issue of "Women's Wear Daily" is a half-page writeup on Otto H. Grosse — one of the top fur farmers of the world. These are extracts: "At the age of 15, young Otto

started his own 10-acre truck farm. In 1922, he married Edna Paterson. Since that time, the Grosse interests have always been a family operation, with their children, Geraldine and Howard, growing up in the business.

FROM FOXES
"An accident which almost cost Mr. Grosse his life and left him crushed and mangled in body was the indirect cause for his turning his attention to mink farming. He launched his own enterprise in 1936, starting out with 165 foxes, and soon gained recognition as a producer of quality pelts.

"This experience proved valuable when he later became one of the pioneers of mink farming in the United States. Today, he is known as one of the nation's major mink ranchers and has been chosen "Man of the Year" in the fur industry by the Fur-Garment Travelling Salesmen's Association."

Quite a number of our breeders on Prince Edward Island and throughout the Maritimes have purchased mutation mink from Mr. Grosse during the past ten years, and that speaks highly for his reputation of fair dealing.
